NO	ITEM	ACTION REQUESTED AT MEETING
1.	INTRODUCTIONS	Councillor Byrne – Chair for the meeting, led introductions and welcomed everyone to the meeting. There were no declarations of interest.
2.	APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE	Received from Councillor Bhavsar and Matt Davinson, City Warden.
3.	ACTION LOG OF PREVIOUS MEETING	Received and agreed as an accurate record.
4.	WARD COUNCILLOR FEEDBACK	<ul> <li>At the last meeting there were discussions about issues on Wesley St, since then a meeting had taken place between residents and Wastecycle, ongoing issues were being looked at with the Highways team.</li> <li>A meeting had taken place with a local school to look at safety issues and improvements that could be made relating to parent parking.</li> <li>A public meeting had been arranged on Tuesday 26<sup>th</sup> July 2016 to discuss ongoing issues relating to Biffa.</li> <li>A meeting had taken place with residents from the lower end of Anstey Lane to discuss and consider issues relating to parking outside the two public houses in that area.</li> </ul>
5.	LOCAL POLICING UPDATE	<ul> <li>PC Mel Germon introduced himself to the meeting and gave a brief update on policing issues in the area since the last meeting.</li> <li>Reported crime statistics since the last meeting were noted.</li> <li>A problem solving plan was in place for Drummond Road to target drugs issues and anti-social behaviour.</li> <li>A campaign would take place over summer to</li> </ul>

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		address issues with people riding motorcycles off road.
		Residents were encouraged to report all incidents and advised that if they wanted to remain anonymous they could. The police were also willing to see away from their homes if they preferred not to have a house visit and the police were contactable through 101 or at local beat surgeries.
6.	HIGHWAYS AND TRANSPORT UPDATE	An officer from the Highways Team was not available at the meeting; however a written update had been provided and was read to those present:
		<ul> <li>Works carried out in 2015/16</li> <li>20mph zones had been introduced in the following areas: Marwood Road, Border Drive and Holderness Road and included traffic calming measures</li> <li>Concrete bay replacements had been put in at Heacham Drive, Parker Drive and Halifax Drive,</li> <li>Redhill Way and Circle lining renewal</li> <li>Approximately 200 potholes and 280 footway defects had been repaired,</li> </ul>
		<ul> <li>Works during 2016/17</li> <li>Redhill Way/Thurcaston Road roundabout resurfaced</li> <li>Bollards to be installed on Hadrian Road to stop footway parking</li> <li>Ongoing routine safety inspections of footway and carriageway surface</li> </ul>
7.	TRANSFORMING NEIGHBOURHOOD S SCHEME - UPDATE	The Community Engagement Officer provided an update on the Transforming Neighbourhoods Scheme. On 17 <sup>th</sup> June 2016 after a public consultation the council made the decision to reorganise neighbourhood services in the North West area.
		<ul> <li>For Abbey Ward this meant that:</li> <li>Mowmacre (Jersey Road) Neighbourhood Housing Office – services would move to the improved Beaumont Leys Library and the vacant property would be marketed commercially,</li> <li>Beaumont Leys (Marwood Road) STAR office</li> </ul>

8.	NEIGHBOURHOOD HOUSING UPDATE	<ul> <li>services would move to the improved Beaumont Leys Library and the shop will be re- let,</li> <li>Stocking Farm Community Centre, Youth Centre and Healthy Living Centre – a separate decision would be taken for the Stocking Farm complex to achieve the required saving on building running costs.</li> <li>Stacey Hewitt, Local Housing Office gave an update on housing matters relating to the Abbey Ward.</li> </ul>
		<ul> <li>It was noted that:</li> <li>Housing services had been working with the Beaumont Leys Policing Team to respond to crime and create a burglary reduction incentive and the Police were thanked for all their help with this.</li> <li>An Abbey Burglary Reduction Day had taken place and ward funding secured at the last meeting had been used towards security packs that were distributed to householders at that event. Feedback from people attending was very positive.</li> <li>There were still some security packs available and these could be collected from the Housing officer or the police at Beaumont Leys station.</li> <li>The remaining funding had been allocated to the cost of installing security lights around Colsterdale Close.</li> <li>It was planned to hold a Community Safety Day in October 2016 – details to be formalised.</li> <li>Leicester to Work – the housing team were working with this scheme which encouraged people to work in the community, building their skills and CV's.</li> <li>Improvements had taken place in Wembury Gardens, Garth Avenue, Halifax Drive.</li> <li>ASB - there were no cases at the moment where eviction action was being sought.</li> </ul>
9.	CITY WARDEN UPDATE	Apologies were received from Matt Davinson, City Warden. An update on City Warden services to be provided to the next meeting.
10.	COMMUNITY MEETING BUDGET	The Community Engagement Officer advised that 7 applications had been received since the last

meeting.
Applications considered since the last meeting: AFC Ladies Football – Grant of £1250 Supported
Gorse Hill City Farm – Grant of £775 Supported
The remaining balance of the Community Budget was £16025 and 5 applications were awaiting final approval.
<ul> <li>A joint bid for funding was being sought towards the cost of a Community Shed at the Redhill allotments. This was pending a decision from Councillors. Mary-Louise Harrison, president of Belgrave Allotment Society gave an outline of the 5 sites in and around Abbey, Belgrave and Rushey Mead wards. The Redhill and Beaumont Leys Lane (Orton Close) allotments had approx. 200 members and a lot of regeneration work had been done at these sites. The meeting was advised that there would also be an Open Day on 30<sup>th</sup> July 2016 at the Redhill Allotment site and everyone was welcome to attend.</li> </ul>
The Chair encouraged applicants to lodge their applications in advance of the meetings to ensure they were considered. Those for £500 or less would continue to be fast tracked.
Applicants were also advised that all applications should be submitted online.
<ul> <li>Update on previously funded bids</li> <li>Never 2 Late Project – this was a police evidence based scheme which was being monitored for the first 6 months after young people had attended the project to see if their behaviour had improved enough for them to be offered an incentive. At the current time the funding had not been spent, the money was in place and it was hoped that in the next couple of months the police would be able to start providing the incentives for the young people and that was where the funding would be used.</li> <li>Jo Wicks, Anti-Social Behaviour Investigator from the Leicester Anti-Social Behaviour Unit (known as LASBU) had applied for a grant of £702 at the last meeting for a pair of</li> </ul>

		permanent goal posts, which would be situated on the large green area on Barsby Walk. Leicester City Council's Housing Department had just installed knee rail fencing across both sides of the green to prevent vehicle access, but this fencing also made the green a safer place to play. The goal posts were installed at the location on 29 <sup>th</sup> March 2016. These goal posts have contributed to there being a decrease in reports of street football in the area and the local Councillors were thanked for their support of this application.
