19.	INTRODUCTION	<p>Councillor Cutkelvin in the Chair.</p> <p>Everyone welcomed and introductions given.</p> <p>No declarations of interest were made.</p>
20.	APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE	<p>Apologies were received from Chris Garner, Herbert and Sue Eppel, and Mr Tahil (Application No. JB5157).</p> <p>The Chair informed those present that Mr Neil Gamble, local resident, had sadly passed away.</p>
21.	ACTION LOG	<p>Members asked the following to be noted as a matter arising from the Action Log of the previous meeting:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Page 2 – 3rd point down – regular council surgeries – the surgery at St Andrew’s Hall, Jarrom Street, would be moved, as it used to cross over with a community group who will no longer be meeting at that time. Councillors would be looking for a location towards the city centre, and were happy to take suggestions. <p>The Action Log was agreed as a correct record.</p>
22.	WARD COUNCILLORS' FEEDBACK	<p>Councillors reported the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Broken fences near to St Mary’s Road were reported and will be repaired.• Piles of litter in a front garden of a half-way house on Knighton Fields Road West were reported to the City Warden, and have since been removed following contact with the prison service.• Councillors reported a complaint to Highways regarding potholes on The Fairway – the stretch of road had since been resurfaced.• Options for bike storage in Neston Gardens has been partially solved – one option being looked

		<p>into was using old drying rooms.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • It was confirmed that Welford Road Police Station had closed. A discussion on what the police were doing in terms of community engagement would be helpful for residents. The building would probably receive a planning application for an education or community involvement premises. • The Council's customer service was moving from Saffron Lane to the Pork Pie Library. A citywide exercise to train frontline staff would be undertaken through the Transforming Neighbourhood Services review. There were some issues around the provision of service to tenants, for example, submission of forms (one courier a day only) Blue Badge and bus pass applications, and no face-to-face service. It was acknowledged that the council was driven by the need to save money, but issues raised would be taken by Councillors back to the Neighbourhood Services and Community Involvement Scrutiny Commission. • The issue of grass verge parking on Jarrom Street looked to have been resolved. • The pantomime event had been a success following hard work from members of the board, and had made £80+ profit. The next pantomime would be held on November 28th 2016 at Saffron Working Men's Club. • The Christmas Fete was also a reported success with over 400 children through the door. The next one would be held on 9th December 2016. • Emails to sort out the Saffron Summer Fete would be sent shortly.
23.	HIGHWAYS UPDATE	<p>Martin Fletcher (Head of Highways) and Ed Kocik (Team Leader, Traffic Operations) were present from the Council, and reported the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Saffron Lane – resurfacing would continue during the summer months. The stretch of road at the Knighton Lane East junction had been resurfaced to improve skid resistance and lines had been remarked. The Road Safety Team were looking at putting a Vehicle Activated sign on Saffron Lane to help highlight the junction to drivers. • There was no pattern to the different sorts of accidents at the junction, and it was believed some were due to bad driving and impatient drivers.

		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 20 miles per hour limits and some traffic calming features would be installed on Bloomfield Road, Copinger Road, Heathcott Road, Cheviot Road and others in the area, as part of an ongoing programme across the city over the next 7-8 years, following consultation feedback of people in favour of the programme. • Grace Road – 2-3 traffic surveys were planned around the cricket ground due to parking problems for residents during cricket matches and football match days. Issues also affected Aylestone Ward. Surveys would take place on 20:20 match days, and the home football game against West Ham. Improvements would also be looked at around the Leicester Royal Infirmary. • Flood warnings had been issued in part of the ward in reference to Greenhithe Road, Boundary Road and Hughenden Drive. Residents were encouraged to sign up to receive a 2-hour phone call warning from the Environment Agency of potential flooding. Residents were advised to ensure they had adequate contents insurance to cover flooding, and to include the Floodline number on local leaflets. <p>The Chair noted it was hoped a cycle lane would be installed along Saffron Lane.</p> <p>The Chair thanked the officers and their staff for their work, and the information and support they provided to Ward Councillors when dealing with ward issues.</p>
24.	HOUSING UPDATE	<p>Ian Stapleton (Area Manager, Housing) reported on the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Housing had worked with Highways, and The Fairway and Helmesley Road had received some verge hardening towards Saffron Lane, funded by the Housing Division. Other areas, including Goldhill would be visited in the next financial year. Parking improvements have assisted grounds maintenance improvement. • Parking on St Andrews would be looked at as a future piece of work. • Housing had worked with ASRA and had been able to develop some housing. 2016 should see the completion of approximately 68 mixed bedroom dwellings on Heathcote Road, with the first ones hopefully being occupied September/October time. It will be confirmed if all 68

		<p>properties are for people on the LCC housing register.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Following consultation with residents, bike racks had been installed in Neston Gardens, in the old drying rooms. There would be zero tolerance to storage arrangements other than bikes, including mobility scooters which were deemed by the Fire Service to be a fire hazard. It was noted as an issue in some sheltered housing, and Cromwell House had external sheds. • Play equipment for the pocket park, Neston Gardens had been purchased, and was awaiting Parks Service to install. • Transforming Neighbourhood Services was looking at buildings and how to staff them. Known as 'Channel Shift' the idea looked at how expensive it was to have someone sat at a desk, on phones, or online. • The current Housing review would see the number of housing managers reduced from six to three. The number of Housing offices would also be reduced, whilst ensuring that those most vulnerable still received a service. • A derelict property at the side of a housing office had planning to convert it to apartments. • A reduction in frontline staff should not affect Housing Repairs, which had been restructured and improved.
25.	POLICE UPDATE	<p>PC Michael Thomas and SPC Charlotte Parry were present and the following update on police issues was given based on the old police boundaries (Freeman Ward):</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Police were now based at Wigston Police Station, and covered the previous Freeman Ward area. Contact details could be found on the Police's website. The station was open Monday to Saturday 10.00am – 6.00pm, Closed all day Sunday. Mansfield House officers covered the new part of Saffron Ward near to Leicester Royal Infirmary, and the station was open 7 days a week. Euston Street station was not open to members of the public, and was just an operation base. • The following police surgeries were planned: 9th April. Aylestone Leisure Centre, 12 noon – 2.00pm 21st April, Saffron Lane Stadium, 6.00pm –

		<p>8.00pm</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Statistics for incidents in the ward for the period of 90 days up to 22/03/16: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ 6 burglaries of dwellings; 10 burglaries other than dwellings (sheds/garages); ○ 8 theft of motor vehicles; ○ 16 theft from motor vehicles; ○ 9 criminal damage - Figures were similar to last year; ○ 61 anti-social behaviour incidents – an increase to the previous year for the same period. ○ There were problems around the Heathcote Road Area and Neston Gardens – a group of youngsters that did not want to engage with partner agencies or the police. There had been some arrests and people brought in and charged for damages. • Problems with fights near local schools had been resolved. • The problem solving plan (PSP) for Marriott Road would be closed and the focus shift to Heathcote Road. • The police, working with King Power Stadium, were hoping to set up a community champions project towards the end of April 2016 with money secured, to education children at the stadium and work to reduce anti-social behaviour. Following success of the project in Highfields, the end goal would be to use some of the Highfields youngsters to do the coaching. • The Chief Constable was trying to protect police from cuts, and beat police had been asked to look at what was cost effective. It was acknowledged that residents engaged with the police through residents meetings, but there would be a reduction in police attendance, though the Joint Action Group (JAG) meetings would remain, and social media would be used to target a geographical area.
26.	CITY WARDEN UPDATE	<p>Noel Cazley, City Warden, reported the following issues:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Fly tipping remained an issue – a hand delivered fly-tip letter had been delivered to residents in St Andrews to remind them of the Waste Management collection service. • In the process of tackling bins on streets. Checks

		<p>on properties on Jarrom Street were in progress.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Households with messy gardens haven been contact. It was taking time to take legal action against residents who were not complying. • Issues with Japanese knotweed in St Andrews. The plants could only be injected during the growing season in April. • Graffiti on Hughenden Drive should be cleared over the next few days. • Complaints regarding dog fouling went straight to Parks Services – parks wardens were authorised to issues tickets. Issues on Aylestone Park would be reported.

As well as fund raising & physical activity one of the core aims of the project is developing community cohesion. We are looking to bring people together, not just people already engaged in community work, but people who have yet to get involved from across the areas. As well as bringing local people together, we are hoping to bring agencies together to work co-productively, the aim being to provide a much more cohesive and joined up service. We ran a pilot fun run last year that accumulated to over £5,000 of sponsorship money and included 30 community groups in the Abbey area. We would now like to extend this offer as a sustainable model for more community groupsWe are hoping to attract upwards of 400 people from across Saffron, Abbey & Belgrave in Leicester, the event will be promoted within the wards stated and surrounding areas. The fun run will take place on July 30th on Abbey Park which has already been booked with festivals & events at LCC. Press will be invited to offer full coverage of the event. 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AF623326I	31/05/2016	Joint	Braunstone Park _ Rowley Fields	FORWARD IN FAITH	We are applying for funding to buy a Minibus to transport peopel from all over the city coming to Cort Crescent for these projects: Running to win; UK Talent	Our project is to buy a minibus that transport young people from ethnic minority communities, disadvantaged people in the community and those who may have given up hope of making it in life. People who will benefit from this project are scattered all over the city. Many of them are concentrated in these three wards: Braunstone Park and Rowley Fields, Beaumont Leys and Saffron. A majority of them live in Braunstone, where the centre is based. One of the handicap of most people from disadvantaged backgrounds is moving around the city. That is why we think if we get a minibus we can use it to fetch people from different segments of the city to come and attend the three project noted below which will go a great deal in addressing issues of poverty, lack and hopelessness. We hope the transport support will empower people without money to travel to have a resources that they can use to go to places that can help them to achieve some of the places they may have not been able to. The bus will operate as a community bus that will move people from different parts of the city to Braunstone in ways that could have been otherwise costly or unsuitable for travel. In addition the bus will foster community cohesion by being offered to community groups that may need to travel, but are unable to afford the mainstream transport services. For example there is no direct bus link between Saffron area to Braunstone. The same is also true for people who may want to travel from Beaumont leys to Braunstone. This bus will be direct and will also help to reduce the carbon footprint by offering people less travel time and also reduced carbon footprint. Our research showed that parents don't have the patience to transport their children for project activities. Banking on parents will mean failure of project. Secondly most parents to our research said they will not want their children to take two buses, passing through town to come to Braunstone yet they feel our projects are unique and would benefit their children greatly. The 3 projects we will be running at Cort Crescent require people to travel from different areas of the city, and without this support many people will not have the appetite to travel. Especially they are school children, the travel time using the existing transport networks will dissuade many from attending. Yet if we get this minibus we are more likely to get many people attending. Our small research has shown that transport needs among ethnic monitory communities and the disadvantaged groups are not appropriately catered for in the city's transport services. This bus will support these three projects that will be running at Cort Crescent: • Running to win• UK Talent• It's still ok. RUNNING TO WINThis is a project for young people aged 5 years to 16 years. The main ethos of the project are to:• equip, educate, inspire and encourage young people to excel• impart the spirit of excellency in young people so that they can be good role models and ambassadors in their local community • To foster values of hard working, honesty, care and love in young people. They achieve this by attending coaching programmes where we invite inspirational speakers who inspire young people to break barriers and aim higher. The programme is open to all children from any community. Currently there are about 20 children taking part, but the potential is about 100 kids to visit every week, but many stay home because of transport problems. The project is run by volunteers and community champions, mainly from the ethnic community who have excelled and use their success to inspire young children to also work hard. This information will be routinely captured in the lifetime of the project through self-assessment, quarterly reviews and feedback sessions with parents and caregivers. <p>UK TALENTThis a project where every Saturday and some Wednesday night over 30 children aged 6 years to 16 years attend meet to learn playing the guitar and keyboard lessons. We believe by giving children this opportunity on Saturdays will help to reduce antisocial behaviour among children from a disadvantaged communities such as Braunstone, Beaumont Leys and Saffron lane. By positively engaging the children and empowering them to gain a skill will help to unleash so many hidden talents in children.</p> <p>Project EvaluationWe will deem this project a success if it meets the following targets:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • At the end of two years over 80 children have attended the project • If at least 60 children and young people can now play the key board and guitar • Continued attendance over the two years will show enthusiasm and that will show the success of the project. <p>IT'S STILL OKAs the name denotes this project will target disadvantaged people from Braunstone, Saffron and Beaumont Leys to gain a skill that they may have thought it's no longer possible for them to gain. At Cort Crescent we have several women groups such as Women of Wisdom and Go Quickly and Tell which are predominantly women's groups. They all meet on Thursday where women meet to teach, socialise and network and gain skills. The project especially aims to equip older women to gain computer skills. Many women, especially from the ethnic minority communities come from backgrounds where they did not gain computer skills or even basic reading and writing skills. In the family environment of Cort Crescent, we hope that this project will help women to feel at home and learn these skills they may have given up on. However because of poverty, and disadvantage many women are unable to travel. We hope this bus will help that by giving them a cheaper option to travel why they can use to travel.</p> <p>Project EvaluationWe will deem this project a success if it meets the following targets:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Over 100 women have attended the sessions over the two year period • At least 100 women have acquired a new skill to do something they may never thought its ok to do. At the beginning of the project, each participant will fill in a questionnaire that will identify their skills deficiencies. This will be used to assess impact and project success. • Evaluation forms will be used to assess impact. • Vocational qualification gained or enrolling on a course will be taken as evidence of project impact. <p>These projects are linked to the Running to win overall project which wants to buy a mini bus that can ferry people across wards. Increased attendance in these projects will be taken as project success. Statistics will be compiled to show project impact before the bus acquisition and after it has been bought. As Forward in Faith we got Cort Crescent to support programmes that equip local residents with fitness, education and life skills training. We hope that the mini-bus will help to encourage many more people to attend. Looking at Braunstone and Rowley Fields ward is big and many children will not be able to walk or use the current public bus options that are</p>

Many parents also will not be able to pick and drop their children because of poverty, limited fuel money and unavailability of cars in their homes. Paying extra bus fares also acts as a disincentive to our project, which is why we are seeking funding to buy this bus. In Braunstone we believe that there is the big vision of urban renewal that has been going on. In our one to one interviews with some groups and local residents and also from anecdotal evidence we have been able to get in-depth insight (albeit in a very small way) into the contemporary neoliberal configurations of class, gender and citizenship that is broadly represented and embodied in the urban neighbourhood of Braunstone. We are quite aware that prior to the £50 million New Deal for Communities regeneration scheme, this area of the city had been recognised as one of the most deprived wards in the UK. As a result of that deprivation the area unfortunately suffered prolonged periods of some neglect and social dislocation in many ways, but thanks to that scheme and the spirit of the people in Braunstone, there has been and continues to be a deep desire to come out of all that social milieu. In our interviews we could sense an air of victory easily recognisable in the groups in Braunstone. We would ideally not desire to rock the boat so to speak, but to contribute to such community ideals by coming in and providing services that go in line with the ideals of the local people. We are a Christian organisation, and our main values and ethos are about love for one another and promoting peace, cohesion, joy, harmony, entrepreneurship and financial independence among people. We hope this project will resonate and reflect in the way and manner that we will engage with locals at Cort Crescent Community Centre.</p>
