7. APPOINTMENT OF CHAIR

Councillor Singh Johal was elected as Chair for the meeting.

8. APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

There were no apologies for absence.

9. DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

Members were asked to declare any disclosable pecuniary or other interest they may have in the business on the agenda.

There were no declarations of interest made.

10. MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING

RESOLVED:

That the minutes of the Licensing (Hearing) Sub-Committee meeting held on 24 July 2018 be confirmed as a correct record.

11. APPLICATION FOR A NEW PREMISES LICENCE WITHIN A CUMULATIVE IMPACT ZONE: PROPOSED NIGHTCLUB, 46 ABBEY STREET, LEICESTER LE1 3TD

The Chief Licensing Officer informed those present that the applicant had withdrawn the application prior to the meeting.

12. APPLICATION FOR A NEW PREMISES LICENCE WITHIN A CUMULATIVE IMPACT ZONE: MINI KARCZMA, 80 NARBOROUGH ROAD, LEICESTER LE3 0BS

The Director of Neighbourhood and Environmental Services submitted a report that required the Sub-Committee to determine an application for a new premises licence within a cumulative impact zone for Mini Karczma, 80 Narborough Road, Leicester, LE3 0BS.

Members noted that a representation had been received in respect of the application, which necessitated that the application had to be considered by Members.

The applicant Ms Magda Zelazek was present with an interpreter. Mr Nigel Rixon was present as police representation. The Chief Licensing Officer, Legal Adviser to the Sub-Committee, and Democratic Support Officer observing the proceedings were also present. A representative from the press was also present.

Introductions were made and the procedure for the meeting was outlined to those present.

The Chief Licensing Officer presented the report. It was noted that a representation was received on 9th July 2018 from a Leicestershire Police that related to the prevention of crime and disorder, and the prevention of public nuisance, public safety, and the protection of children from harm. The Police were concerned the application had made no reference to the cumulative impact zone in her application to show the premises would not add to existing problems in the area. They also commented that the promotion of the licensing objectives had not been considered on the application, and had specified conditions they would like added to the licence if granted.

Mr Rixon outlined the reasons for the police's representation and answered questions from Members.

Ms Zelazek through the interpreter was then given the opportunity to respond to the points made and answered questions from Members and Mr Rixon.

All parties were then given the opportunity to sum up their positions and make any final comments.

Prior to Members considering the application, the Legal Adviser to the Sub-Committee advised Members of the options available to them in making a decision. Members were also advised of the relevant policy and statutory guidance that needed to be taken into account when making their decision.

In reaching their decision, Members felt they should deliberate in private on the basis that this was in the public interest, and as such outweighed the public interest of their deliberation taking place with the parties represented present.

The Chief Licensing Officer, Legal Adviser to the Sub-Committee, Mr Rixon, Ms Zelazek and her interpreter, and representative from the press then withdrew from the meeting.

Members then gave the application full and detailed consideration.

The Legal Adviser to the Sub-Committee was then recalled to the hearing to give advice on the wording of the decision.

The Chief Licensing Officer, Mr Rixon, Ms Zelazek and her interpreter, and representative from the press then returned to the meeting.

The Chair informed all persons present that they had recalled the Legal Adviser to the Sub-Committee for advice on the wording of their decision.

RESOLVED:

That the application for a new premises licence within a cumulative impact zone for Mini Karczma, 80 Narborough Road, Leicester, LE3 0BS be REFUSED.

REASON FOR THE DECISION

The Sub-Committee had listened carefully to all the representations and had taken into account the statutory guidance and the Council's Licensing Policy, including its special policy on cumulative impact in relation to the Braunstone Gate area of the City.

The Sub-Committee believed that insufficient information had been received from the applicant to demonstrate how she would prevent further impact on issues in the Cumulative Impact Zone. That remained the case despite the comments made by the applicant during the hearing.

Therefore, the Sub-Committee believed that in making their decision, it was appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives of the prevention of crime and disorder, public safety, the prevention of public nuisance and the protection of children from harm to reject the application.

However, their advice to the applicant was if she were to submit the application again, she would need to give due consideration to the Council's Cumulative Impact Policy and consideration of training for herself and her staff.

1.1. This report provides information for Members about an application made under the Licensing Act 2003, to assist them in determining the outcome of that application.


2. Determination to be made

- 2.1. Having considered the application and representations, Members must consider whether to
 - Grant the licence without modification
 - Grant the licence subject to conditions
 - Exclude from the licence any of the licensable activities
 - Refuse to accept the proposed premises supervisor
 - Reject the application

3. Summary

3.1 This report outlines an application for a new premises licence for 268-270 Catherine Street, Leicester and summarises the representations received. It also highlights the licensing objectives, the relevant parts of the guidance and regulations, and the pertinent sections of the Licensing Authority's Licensing Policy.

4. Location Plan



5. Application

- 5.1 An application was received on 26th June 2018 from Ms Mehzabin Gabal for a new premises licence for Jaan Café & Restaurant, 268-270 Catherine Street, Leicester. A copy of the application is attached at Appendix A.

6. Steps to Promote the Licensing Objectives

- 6.1 The steps the applicant proposes to take to promote the licensing objectives are set out in the operating schedule (see section 18 of Appendix A).
- 6.2 In arriving at its decision on the application, the Licensing Authority's primary consideration must be the promotion of the licensing objectives.

7. Regulated entertainment

- 7.1 The Live Music Act 2012 and the Legislative Reform (Entertainment Licensing) Order 2014 amended the Licensing Act 2003 in relation to the provision of regulated entertainment. Certain entertainment does not require a licence subject to audience limits, between 08.00 and 23.00 hours each day.
- 7.2 The above exemptions may affect the application under consideration because conditions may not be imposed at this stage to control live or recorded music that is unregulated. However, if problems do occur as a result of that entertainment then conditions may be imposed to control such music in the future after a formal review.

8. Representation

- 8.1 Twenty nine representations were received between 20th July and 25th July 2018 from local residents and a Ward Councillor. The representations relate to the prevention of crime and disorder, the prevention of public nuisance and public safety. The residents and Ward Councillor are concerned that this is a quiet residential area and the late opening hours will increase noise pollution, anti-social behaviour, litter and parking issues. Twenty four of the representations were an identical letter and a copy is attached as Appendix B1. The other representations are attached at Appendix B2-B6.
- 8.2 A representation was received from Leicestershire Police on 24th July 2018. The representation relates to the prevention of crime and disorder, the prevention of public nuisance, public safety and the protection of children from harm. Leicestershire Police are concerned that the applicant has failed to clarify on her application form how she will operate the business with regards to the sale of alcohol and late night refreshment and how she will promote the four licensing objectives. A Copy of the representation is attached at Appendix B7.
- 8.3 A representation was received from Noise & Pollution Control on 24th July 2018. The representation relates to the prevention of public nuisance. Noise & Pollution Control are concerned that music from the premises has the potential to cause a nuisance to the occupiers of the flats directly above the premises and to the surrounding residential properties. A Copy of the representation is attached at Appendix B8.

9. Conditions

9.1 The conditions that are consistent with the operating schedule and the representation are attached at Appendix C.





 work and is not subject to a condition preventing the holder from doing work relating to the carrying on of a
 licensable activity.

- A current Biometric Immigration Document (Biometric Residence Permit) issued by the Home Office to the holder which indicates that the named person can currently stay in the UK and is allowed to work relation to the carrying on of a licensable activity.
- A current Residence Card issued by the Home Office to a person who is not a national of a European Economic

 reasonable evidence that the person has an appeal or administrative review pending on an immigration
 decision, such as an appeal or administrative review reference number.
- Reasonable evidence that a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights of residence in exercising treaty rights in the UK including:-
 - evidence of the applicant's own identity such as a passport,
 - evidence of their relationship with the European Economic Area family member e.g. a marriage certificate, civil partnership certificate or birth certificate, and
 - evidence that the European Economic Area national has a right of permanent residence in the UK or is one
 of the following if they have been in the UK for more than 3 months:
 - (i) working e.g. employment contract, wage slips, letter from the employer,
 - (ii) self-employed e.g. contracts, invoices, or audited accounts with a bank,
 - (iii) studying e.g. letter from the school, college or university and evidence of sufficient funds; or





I feel very seriously how to respond while we and surrounding community residents are already facing too many anti-social behaviour, noise problems, planning application and parking issues around this area. Me and one other resident Mr Hirji Parmar went yesterday to see our ward Councillor Ross Willmott in his surgery and explain all the issues which we and residents are facing these days. This notice surprised us and residents of Catherine Street and Sutton Avenue. Quite a lot of residents of nearby this Café are old and don't now how to respond. Its my nature to help other surrounding close knit community which I always done in the past and I will do my best in the future.

Notice should be put the on the lamp post or somewhere where people can see. But it never happened and the surrounding community surprised.

We are strongly objecting this application on the following issues.

Too many Off Licences already nearby like Apna Punjab Meet Shop 266 Catherine St, Sabu's Off Licence 259 Catherine St, Purley Road News Paper Off Licence, Vishal Restaurant Catherine St, Tadka Restaurant and Coronation Pub Catherine St etc. So there is no need for another one.

We are already experiencing noise problems during night even sometimes early morning till 01:00 Loud music from Tadka and Coronation Pub quite a lot during weekends till late.

We are living here nearly 42 years and never encounter any problems with the previous owner Catherine Wheel Café. Most of the surrounding residents are old and living here more than 40 years. Since the new owner bought this café creates a lot of problems.

Everyone got the right to live peacefully as their fundamental right.

At present this Café closes 23:00 everyday. Even after closing we can still hear noise everyday in his back yard sometimes till 12:30. Its disturbing and upset our sleep.

We are already facing parking issues around this corner. And it will create more problems on this corner while in the past Leicester City Council puts a lot of bollards on the this corner on both sides.



I wish to register my objections to an application for a premises drinks and entertainment licence. The reference number is 106577. The premises are Jaan Cafe and Restaurant, 268-270 Catherine Street, Leicester, LE4 6GD.

My objections are as follows:

- 1. There are several drinks and entertainment facilities already around this area, both in premises and off-sales, so I would contend there is no need for yet another such location in what is a heavily residential area.
- 2. This applicants premises is in a heavily residential area which is normally quiet after 11pm. This applicant is proposing to stay open until 1am most days except Saturdays when it would be open until 2am. There are a high number of family homes in the immediate area around the applicant's location as well as further afield so any noise from the applicant's location either recorded music, customers of the applicant arriving and departing the premises either by foot or in vehicles up to the proposed times would have a strongly deleterious effect upon those families with young children trying to sleep.
- 3. The extra vehicles coming to/departing from the premises will cause extra disruption and noise problems for the residents in its immediate proximity both during the pre midnight and the post midnight periods. People invariably talk loudly as well as playing their car stereos at a loud volume. Moreso in the quieter hours of the early morning when sound travels further and seems much louder than normally.
- 4. The nature of the proposed activities will, by their very nature, invariably attract an anti-social element into an area where there have already been some anti-social behaviour incidents recorded and therefore will increase and exacerbate these problems.
- 5. Litter is highly likely to increase based upon my present experience when I find emptied drinks bottles and cans which have been thrown into my house's front hardstanding having been bought from one of the off-sales facilities already in the area then thrown away after being emptied of their contents.

I write in my capacity as a licensing officer for the Leicestershire Police on the authority delegated to me by the Chief Constable.

My representation relates to all four licensing objectives.

This is a new premises licence application for a premises that currently trades as a café only. The applicant in her operating schedule has failed to clarify how she will promote the four licensing objectives.

It is unclear in the application how the premises will operate with regard to the sale of alcohol and late night refreshment in particular the on and off sales.

The application has omissions regarding provision of recorded music which

needs to be clarified at part 11.

In addition the premises is located in a residential part of the city. The application fails to demonstrate how they will reduce noise, public nuisance and antisocial behaviour to the local community.

Further it is unclear in the application whether food and alcohol will be provided as part of a takeaway service and what prevention measures have been taken to prevent underage sales.

The police are continuing to negotiate with the applicant to reach a mutual agreement and make a hearing unnecessary.

Please give further details of why you believe this application will have an adverse effect on the licensing objectives

The premise is located directly beneath at least one flat. I have been unable to find any indication that there is any acoustic insulation between the restaurant, originally a café, and the flat above. The restaurant has unconditional planning consent, and so no acoustic insulation scheme has been required, probably because the original consent, in 1969, was for a café, unlikely to be open after 2300.

Even without music noise from customers in a busy restaurant is likely to be audible in the flat above. The inclusion of music as a licensable activity, in practice after 2300, which will be louder than background music, is very likely to be detrimental to occupiers of the flat above

The restaurant is in a residential area, with houses on one side and opposite. Traffic and footfall is low on Catherine street is after 2300, and consequently there is also the potential for customers leaving the premises to disturb local residents

We have had no complaints about noise from the restaurant at present, as you would expect since, without a current licence, the restaurant operating times are limited to no later than 2300.

Unfortunately I do not feel that conditions will mitigate the potential noise issues. A noise limiter set at an agreed level will control the volume of music, but, with no acoustic insulation, I suspect that this will need to be reduced to background levels, not licensable in any case. Notwithstanding this, noise from customers is difficult to control.

Even if an acoustic insulation scheme is installed, there is still the potential for customers leaving the premises late at night to disturb local residents

I therefore object to the proposed licence

CONDITIONS CONSISTENT WITH THE OPERATING SCHEDULE

The licence holder will ensure that CCTV is installed and images will be kept for a 28 days. Copies will be made available to the Police on request.

The licence holder will ensure a refusals book is used and kept behind the bar.

The licence holder will adopt the "Challenge 21" policy.

The licence holder will ensure extra litter bins will be placed outside the premises to reduce the amount of litter.

The licence holder will ensure doors will remain closed to avoid excess noise leaving the building.
