# CAPITAL RECEIPTS INITIATIVE : ALLOCATION OF RESOURCES TO TENANT ASSOCIATION INITIATIVES 2001/2002

### Report of the Director of Housing

#### 1. SUMMARY & RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1.1 This report proposes a programme of work for this financial year under the above initiative, in line with the Cabinet's decision in January 2001, on the Housing Capital Programme 2000/2001 and 2001/2002.
- 1.2 The report presents to Members a summary of all the bids received from the various Tier 2's in the City and, in the case of Braunstone, where there is currently no Tier 2, bids from the Neighbourhood Manager in consultation with the Ward Councillors, the local MP, the Police, Braunstone New Deal and the Braunstone Residents Action Group.
- 1.3 The Cabinet is **recommended** to :-
- i) consider the attached bids under the 'Capital Receipts Initiative' and indicate whether it supports the schemes proposed;
- ii) indicate whether door entry systems, dropped kerbs/hardstandings etc should only proceed if owner occupiers meet their full share of the costs involved:
- iii) instruct the Central, Humberstone and Beaumont Leys Tier 2's to review or reprioritise their bids to stay within the resources allocated;
- iv) approve the bids from New Parks and Saffron Tier 2's; and
- v) approve the bid from Braunstone Tier 2 subject to no work being undertaken on streets covered by the demolition proposal, until such time as Cabinet has made a final decision.

#### 2. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

2.1 In total, 75 bids were received with an overall value of £926,781. Members will recall that, in total, Tier 2's were allocated £720,000 from the Capital Programme but also had £183,000 available from their Environmental Budgets. Although in total the figures appear to balance (allowing for a small amount of over programming) in reality a number of Tier 2's (ie Central, New Parks, Humberstone and Beaumont Leys) have bid for resources in excess of those allocated. A breakdown, by area, is shown below for Members information:

- 2.2 From the above Members will no doubt note that four areas have bid for more resources than was allocated to them (although New Parks is only slightly above) one had bid for slightly less resources than was allocated to them (Saffron) and one had bid in accordance with the resources available (Braunstone). In addition, two areas, Braunstone (who bid in line with their resources) and Saffron (who bid slightly below their resources), have prepared a reserve list which would only go ahead if there was slippage on the higher priority schemes.
- 2.3 However, in the case of Humberstone, they have already allocated the £30,500 from their Environmental Budget towards the schemes and therefore are still over programmed by £10,845.
- 2.4 Central's over programming of £90,200, is well in excess of the resources available to them although they have prioritised their schemes and therefore, it is likely that only schemes 1 6 of the Charnwood/St Marks proposal would go ahead within the resources available. However, this needs to be confirmed.
- 2.5 Beaumont Leys has also already earmarked its full Environmental Budget to support work associated with the Bewcastle Grove Shopping Parade and therefore is still over programmed by £29,550.

#### 3. BACKGROUND

- 3.1 Cabinet agreed in January 2001 to set aside £720,000, i.e. £120,000 per area, within the Housing Capital Programme, under the heading 'Capital Receipts Initiative, to allow Tenant Associations to bid, via the Tier 2 structure, for projects within their area.
- 3.2 However, to ensure consistency and give some guidance to tenants Cabinet laid down that expenditure must achieve at least two of the following to qualify for support:
  - 1. Safeguard the Council's assets
  - 2. Reduce ongoing revenue costs
  - 3. Stimulate employment/the economy within the City (i.e. jobs and training).
  - 4. Improve the lettability of the Council's housing stock.
  - 5. Tackle disadvantage.
  - 6. Improve security of properties and estates (i.e. help combat crime).
  - 7. Meet the aspirations of tenants.

In addition, Cabinet insisted that all bids must meet the following:

i) only require a capital injection (ie have no ongoing revenue costs).

- ii) directly benefit local inhabitants.
- iii) improve the quality of life for local people.
- iv) reinforce the value of housing improvements being undertaken.
- v) achieve good value for money.
- vi) complement the Government's wider policy objectives of Welfare to Work and Social Exclusion.

Consequently, it was considered that schemes would normally meet one of the following criteria, although it was acknowledged that other initiatives were not excluded:

- a) demolition and landscaping of unused garage sites;
- b) clearing and/or development of corner plot sites;
- c) landscape improvements on Council estates;
- d) improvements to spinneys in the City;
- e) environmental improvements on estates;
- f) initiatives to overcome small pocket problems with stock on estates;
- g) erection of bollards on footpaths to prevent cycling/motor bike riding;
- h) security initiatives around and in vulnerable properties.

Officers have checked and analysed the attached list of bids which fall into six distinct categories:

- Security in and around tenants homes, including creating defensible space (24 bids totalling £279,050)
- CCTV (1 bid totalling £28,000)
- Door Entry Systems (8 bids totalling £198,600 including one bid for a relocation of a door entry system)
- Parking issues (9 bids totalling £53,737)
- Pathway/fencing/lighting initiatives (23 bids totalling £245,144)
- Other (10 bids totalling £122,250)

- 3.3 In total, 75 bids were received with an overall value of £926,781. Members will recall that, in total, Tier 2's were allocated £720,000 from the Capital Programme but also had £183,000 available from their Environmental Budgets. Although in total the figures appear to balance (allowing for a small amount of over programming) in reality a number of the bids (ie Central, New Parks, Humberstone and Beaumont Leys) have bid for resources in excess of those allocated.
- 3.4 For Members information, the top priority was given to security in and around tenants homes, particularly elderly tenants homes. This accounted for 24 bids. Pathways, fencing and lighting initiatives receiving the second highest number of bids, receiving 23. Therefore, the top two priorities accounted for almost two thirds of all the bids received.
- 3.5 However, in considering the other bids, Members may wish to take a view on the bid for Door Entry Systems as clearly, if these were to be installed in blocks of flats/maisonettes, where tenants have previously exercised their Right to Buy, then the scheme could only proceed if those owner occupiers involved agreed to meet their share of the costs otherwise the full cost would fall, unfairly, on Council tenants. Members views would be welcomed on this issue.
- 3.6 In reviewing the overall programme Members are recommended to indicate whether they endorse the nature of the schemes proposed and then to instruct Tier 2's to reprioritise their schemes to stay within the resources allocated.
