#### Please summarise your concerns about this application:

I write in my capacity as Deputy Licensing Manager for Leicestershire Police on the authority delegated to me by the Chief Constable.

This is an application for a new premises licence for the Curry Flavour Restaurant at 225 Uppingham Road, Leicester.

The premises is an established restaurant which would now like to be able to sell alcohol along with meals that have been purchased by their clientele. They also wish to provide late night refreshments until 02:00 hours on a Friday and Saturday.

The venue is situated in amongst a variety of other businesses on Uppingham Road.

Uppingham Road (A47) itself, is one of the main arterial routes into the city and is busy both in the hours of Day Time Economy and also Night Time Economy.

Leicestershire police are concerned that the present application fails to promote the 4 licensing objectives.

The applicant has stated that this establishment will be a family orientated restaurant which will also be providing a take away service.

We feel that the applicant has not taken into consideration the problems that could occur if they were allowed to sell alcohol alone (without having the need to purchase a meal) as this could lead to people who have already consumed alcohol using the premises as a stop off point whilst they are either going to or from other establishments.

If this was to happen it could lead to outbreaks of crime and disorder or public nuisance which in turn could put their other customers at risk.

Leicestershire Police are concerned that the licensing objectives of Crime & Disorder, Public Safety, The Prevention Of Public Nuisance and Protecting Children from Harm will not be promoted if this licence is granted in its current format.

Our representation does not seek a refusal of the premises licence. Our representation seeks the addition of specific conditions in order to promote the licensing objectives that are clear and specific to the operator and responsible authorities.

The additional conditions/changes we would like to include on the licence, should they be acceptable by the applicant are as follows.

#### The Supply Of Alcohol

- 1. Alcohol shall not be sold or supplied unless it is ancillary to a substantial meal that is purchased at the same time.
- 2. Customers who are purchasing take away food may also be served alcohol once their order has been placed.

We are at present, trying to engage with the applicant and come to an agreement that may negate the need for a hearing in respect to the representations made by the police.
