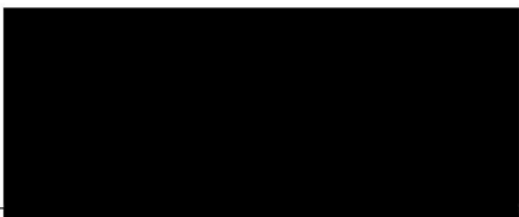

Entitlement to work/immigration status for individual applicants and applications from partnerships which are not limited liability partnerships:

A licence may not be held by an individual or an individual in a partnership who is resident in the UK who:

- does not have the right to live and work in the UK; or
- is subject to a condition preventing him or her from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity.

Any premises licence issued in respect of an application made on or after 6 April 2017 will become invalid if the holder ceases to be entitled to work in the UK.

Applicants must demonstrate that they have an entitlement to work in the UK and are not subject to a condition preventing them from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity. They do this in one of two ways: 1) by providing with this application copies or scanned copies of the documents listed below (which do not need to be certified), or 2) by providing their 'share code' to enable the licensing authority to carry out a check using the Home Office online right to work checking service (see below).

Documents which demonstrate entitlement to work in the UK

- An expired or current passport showing the holder, or a person named in the passport as the child of the holder, is a British citizen or a citizen of the UK and Colonies having the right of abode in the UK [please see note below about which sections of the passport to copy].
- An expired or current passport or national identity card showing the holder, or a person named in the passport as the child of the holder, is a national of a European Economic Area country or Switzerland.
- A Registration Certificate or document certifying permanent residence issued by the Home Office to a national of a European Economic Area country or Switzerland.
- A Permanent Residence Card issued by the Home Office to the family member of a national of a European Economic Area country or Switzerland.
- A **current** Biometric Immigration Document (Biometric Residence Permit) issued by the Home Office to the holder indicating that the person named is allowed to stay indefinitely in the UK, or has no time limit on their stay in the UK.
- A **current** passport endorsed to show that the holder is exempt from immigration control, is allowed to stay indefinitely in the UK, has the right of abode in the UK, or has no time limit on their stay in the UK.
- A **current** Immigration Status Document issued by the Home Office to the holder with an endorsement indicating that the named person is allowed to stay indefinitely in the UK or has no time limit on their stay in the UK, **when produced in combination with** an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A birth or adoption certificate issued in the UK, **when produced in combination with** an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A birth or adoption certificate issued in the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man or Ireland **when produced in combination with** an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A certificate of registration or naturalisation as a British citizen, **when produced in combination with** an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.

- A **current** passport endorsed to show that the holder is allowed to stay in the UK and is currently allowed to work and is not subject to a condition preventing the holder from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity.
- A **current** Biometric Immigration Document (Biometric Residence Permit) issued by the Home Office to the holder which indicates that the named person can currently stay in the UK and is allowed to work relation to the carrying on of a licensable activity.
- A **current** Residence Card issued by the Home Office to a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights or residence.
- A **current** Immigration Status Document containing a photograph issued by the Home Office to the holder with an endorsement indicating that the named person may stay in the UK, and is allowed to work and is not subject to a condition preventing the holder from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity **when produced in combination with** an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A Certificate of Application, **less than 6 months old**, issued by the Home Office under regulation 18(3) or 20(2) of the Immigration (European Economic Area) Regulations 2016, to a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights of residence.
- Reasonable evidence that the person has an outstanding application to vary their permission to be in the UK with the Home Office such as the Home Office acknowledgement letter or proof of postage evidence, or reasonable evidence that the person has an appeal or administrative review pending on an immigration decision, such as an appeal or administrative review reference number.
- Reasonable evidence that a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights of residence in exercising treaty rights in the UK including:-
 - evidence of the applicant's own identity – such as a passport,
 - evidence of their relationship with the European Economic Area family member – e.g. a marriage certificate, civil partnership certificate or birth certificate, and
 - evidence that the European Economic Area national has a right of permanent residence in the UK or is one of the following if they have been in the UK for more than 3 months:
 - (i) working e.g. employment contract, wage slips, letter from the employer,
 - (ii) self-employed e.g. contracts, invoices, or audited accounts with a bank,
 - (iii) studying e.g. letter from the school, college or university and evidence of sufficient funds; or
 - (iv) self-sufficient e.g. bank statements.

Family members of European Economic Area nationals who are studying or financially independent must also provide evidence that the European Economic Area national and any family members hold comprehensive sickness insurance in the UK. This can include a private medical insurance policy, an EHIC card or an S1, S2 or S3 form.

Original documents must not be sent to licensing authorities. If the document copied is a passport, a copy of the following pages should be provided:-

- (i) any page containing the holder's personal details including nationality;
- (ii) any page containing the holder's photograph;
- (iii) any page containing the holder's signature;
- (iv) any page containing the date of expiry; and
- (v) any page containing information indicating the holder has permission to enter or remain in the UK and is permitted to work.

If the document is not a passport, a copy of the whole document should be provided.

Your right to work will be checked as part of your licensing application and this could involve us checking your immigration status with the Home Office. We may otherwise share information with the Home Office. Your licence application will not be determined until you have complied with this guidance.

Home Office online right to work checking service

As an alternative to providing a copy of the documents listed above, applicants may demonstrate their right to work by allowing the licensing authority to carry out a check with the Home Office online right to work checking service.

To demonstrate their right to work via the Home Office online right to work checking service, applicants should include in this application their 9-digit share code (provided to them upon accessing the service at <https://www.gov.uk/prove-right-to-work>) which, along with the applicant's date of birth (provided within this application), will allow the licensing authority to carry out the check.

In order to establish the applicant's right to work, the check will need to indicate that the applicant is allowed to work in the United Kingdom and is not subject to a condition preventing them from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity.

- Films: no licence is required for 'not-for-profit' film exhibition held in community premises between 08:00 and 23:00 on any day provided that the audience does not exceed 500 and the organiser (a) gets consent to the screening from a person who is responsible for the premises; and (b) ensures that each such screening abides by age classification ratings.
- Indoor sporting events: no licence is required for performances between 08:00 and 23:00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 1000.
- Boxing or Wrestling Entertainment: no licence is required for a contest, exhibition or display of Greco-Roman wrestling, or freestyle wrestling between 08:00 and 23:00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 1000. Combined fighting sports – defined as a contest, exhibition or display which combines boxing or wrestling with one or more martial arts – are licensable as a boxing or wrestling entertainment rather than an indoor sporting event.
- Live music: no licence permission is required for:
 - o a performance of unamplified live music between 08:00 and 23:00 on any day, on any premises.
 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08:00 and 23:00 on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08:00 and 23:00 on any day, in a workplace that is not licensed to sell alcohol on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08:00 and 23:00 on any day, in a church hall, village hall, community hall, or other similar community premises, that is not licensed by a premises licence to sell alcohol, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance from a person who is responsible for the premises.
 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08:00 and 23:00 on any day, at the non-residential premises of (i) a local authority, or (ii) a school, or (iii) a hospital, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance on the relevant premises from: (i) the local authority concerned, or (ii) the school or (iii) the health care provider for the hospital.
- Recorded Music: no licence permission is required for:
 - o any playing of recorded music between 08:00 and 23:00 on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
 - o any playing of recorded music between 08:00 and 23:00 on any day, in a church hall, village hall, community hall, or other similar community premises, that is not licensed by a premises licence to sell alcohol, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance from a person who is responsible for the premises.
 - o any playing of recorded music between 08:00 and 23:00 on any day, at the non-residential premises of (i) a local authority, or (ii) a school, or (iii) a hospital, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance on the relevant premises from: (i) the local authority concerned, or (ii) the school proprietor or (iii) the health care provider for the hospital.

- Dance: no licence is required for performances between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 500. However, a performance which amounts to adult entertainment remains licensable.
- Cross activity exemptions: no licence is required between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, with no limit on audience size for:
 - o any entertainment taking place on the premises of the local authority where the entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the local authority;
 - o any entertainment taking place on the hospital premises of the health care provider where the entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the health care provider;
 - o any entertainment taking place on the premises of the school where the entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the school proprietor; and
 - o any entertainment (excluding films and a boxing or wrestling entertainment) taking place at a travelling circus, provided that (a) it takes place within a moveable structure that accommodates the audience, and (b) that the travelling circus has not been located on the same site for more than 28 consecutive days.

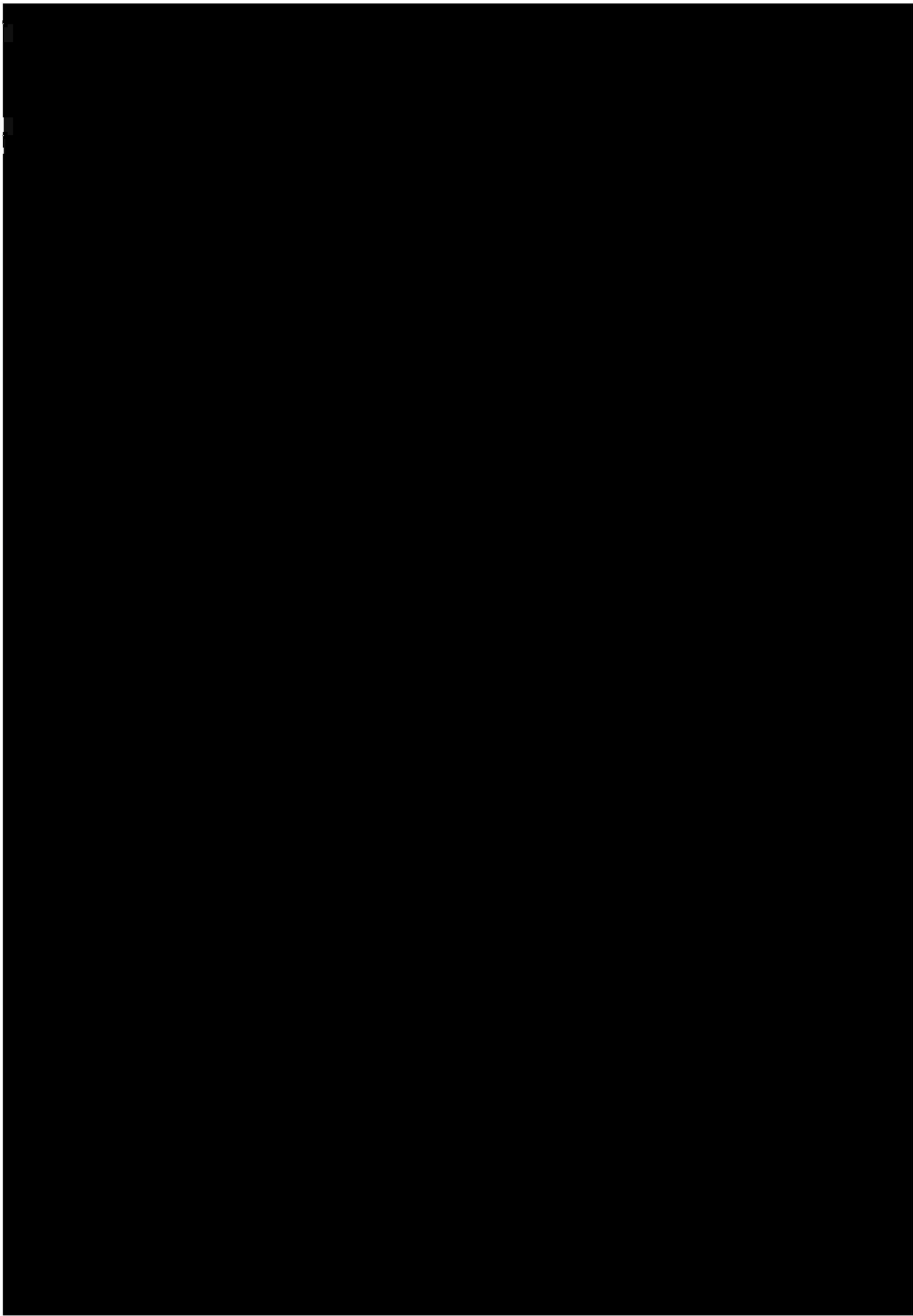

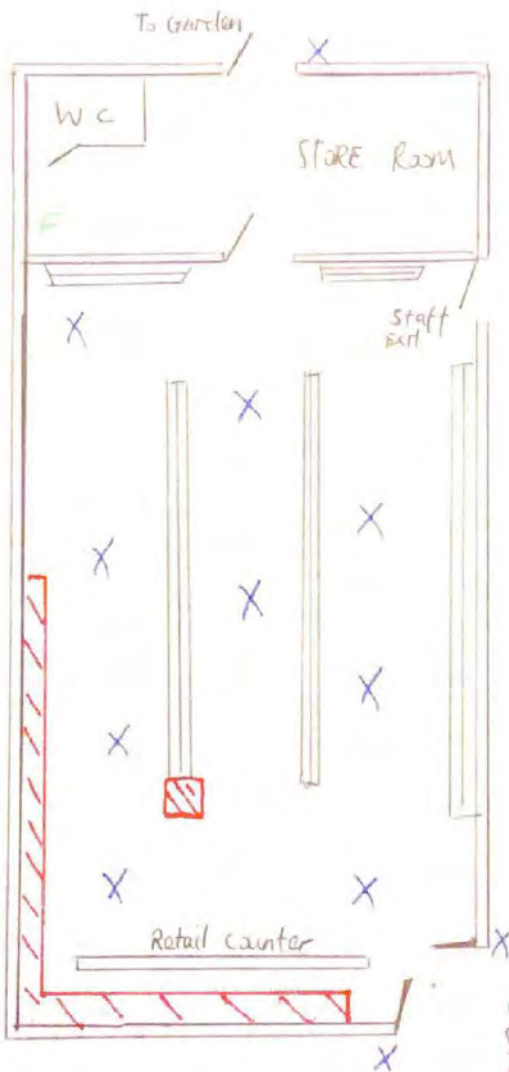

[REDACTED] wish to raise the following objections in relation to the premises licence above:

2. Mr Khunti proposes to open a new off-licence [REDACTED]
3. [REDACTED] object to the licence being granted as the new application will create issues in respect of crime and disorder. [REDACTED] which is likely to be the case if the licence is granted to the above applicant due to the proposed trading days and hours.
4. The applicant's application may also potentially lead to an increase in youth crime which will become an on-going problem in the area. Due to the trading hours proposed, the premises could become a spot for youths to hang around after school and through to the late night. The area has many settled residents, and this would simply cause a nuisance and is not in the public interest.
5. Also, for prevention of public safety and public nuisance the above application is likely to substantially reduce the good order of the area.
6. The hours of operation proposed by the applicant will result in noise emanating from his premises, vibrations, lighting, and litter which will again unnecessarily cause public nuisance.
7. I also object on the basis that the opening of such premises may result in harm being caused to youths in the area. It is more than likely that the proposed applicant will encourage children to be on the premises till late evening potentially at risk of harm because activities are being carried out at the premises which may cause harm to children under the age of 18 such as the sale of alcohol. This will subsequently lead to underage drinking, disruption to the community and residents generally, with the increased problem of alcohol misuse in youths.

I have set out my objections in line with public interest [REDACTED] in the matter and note that granting such licence will subsequently cause more issues for the community as well as other businesses in the area. There is a harmony amongst the community in the area and the addition of another premises selling alcohol could jeopardise the peace the residents currently enjoy.

Please summarise your concerns about this application: The junction where the premises is located is in a residential area, not a shopping area, and already has a corner shop that sells alcohol. An additional outlet for alcohol is likely to increase crime and disorder and public nuisance in the neighbourhood, and to expose children to greater harm. The junction is also the scene of regular road traffic accidents, with the collisions being propelled towards the area where a new

outlet is proposed, rather than towards the existing corner shop.

Please give further details of WHY you believe this application will have an adverse effect on the licensing objectives : Prevention of Crime and Disorder

46 Fairfax Road is situated on the northern corner of the junction between Fairfax Road and Edgehill Road. [REDACTED]

If alcohol is also to be sold from 46 Edgehill Road, there will be a big increase in the availability of alcohol at this crossroads. The links between alcohol and crime are well-established:

“Every year, alcohol is associated with 1 million crimes in the UK.[2] ... Research has highlighted the role of alcohol in domestic violence, sexual assault,[11] child abuse,[12] and violent crime including murder.[13]” Institute of Alcohol Studies, Crime and Social Impacts

The amount of alcohol sold at this junction should be limited to the one shop that currently sells it. If an additional licence is allowed, crime and disorder can be expected to increase.

“The legal availability of alcohol is generally accepted to be one of the main controls on levels of alcohol consumption and harm.” Institute of Alcohol Studies, Availability and Licensing

Prevention of Public Nuisance

There is an established [REDACTED] shop [REDACTED] which already sells alcoholic drinks (along with groceries, newspapers, stationery etc.)

We already have some litter that originates from [REDACTED] including discarded beer cans from that shop. A second shop selling alcoholic drinks will greatly increase this particularly unwanted kind of litter (especially problematic because it advertises alcohol to children and other vulnerable people). Broken glass is likely, with its potential danger to children playing in the street.

A second shop selling alcohol is likely to attract more groups of people to linger, which will lead to more noise. Of extra concern are the hours applied for – much longer than those [REDACTED] I don't want extra noise at any time of the day or night.

Parking by customers is also likely to cause problems in the area. Two parking bays off Edgehill Road are shown on the plans for 44/46 Fairfax Road; however, because Edgehill Road is one way, customers planning to continue their journeys by driving along Fairfax Road are likely to avoid these parking bays so that they don't have to drive round a block. A new shop selling alcohol is likely to attract quite a few customers. This will make it difficult for local residents to find parking space in an area where parking is already difficult to find.

Protection of Children from Harm

The area where 46 Fairfax Road is sited isn't an area of shops – it's a residential area where children play and old people stroll, and where everyone needs to feel safe and relaxed while outside. Increased easy access to alcohol is likely to jeopardise people's feeling of security within their own neighbourhood; this, in turn, would adversely impact the mental wellbeing of the children.

[REDACTED] already sells alcohol [REDACTED] An expansion of alcohol sales at this crossroads would get the attention of local children, who would increasingly interpret alcohol as a desirable product. This would represent constant free advertising of alcoholic drinks to vulnerable youngsters, and would be particularly problematic. I don't want [REDACTED] to be subjected to this.

Drinkaware's research suggests a strong link between the frequency of young people's underage drinking and their exposure to drinking at home. Leicester has significant rates of alcohol related

harm, with a mortality and hospital admission rate far higher than the national average. (Leicester City Council) So it is highly likely that there are children in our locality who are harmed by alcohol use in their home. In order to decrease the harmful use of alcohol, the World Health Organisation recommends reducing the number of retail outlets that sell alcohol: "Enact and enforce restrictions on the physical availability of retailed alcohol (via reduced density of retail outlets and reduced hours of sale)." World Health Organisation's "best buy" recommendation. See WHO Management of Substance Abuse, Strengthen restrictions on alcohol availability.

In other words, an additional outlet selling alcohol would do additional harm to parents, and so to their children.

Children are also likely to linger in groups near the shop, and so be exposed to the danger of road traffic accidents (as outlined under "Public Safety" below).

Public Safety

46 Fairfax Road is situated on the north corner of the junction between Fairfax Road and Edgehill Road, in a residential area. Fairfax Road, now a route to the busy Victoria Road East, is often quite busy; Edgehill Road is sometimes also quite busy.

There are regular road traffic accidents at this junction, the most recent of which occurred in December, 2020. One collision, 30 years ago, resulted in the death of a pedestrian, a neighbour who had two young children, who was fatally injured outside 46 Fairfax Road. [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] it was a traumatic time for everyone in the area. Since then, traffic calming measures have been implemented; however, these have been offset by Fairfax Road becoming busier (it is now used as a feeder road for the very busy extension of Victoria Road East).

The reason why this junction has more accidents than others in the area is unclear, but may be partly because the Fairfax Road/Edgehill Road junction has been changed to give priority to Edgehill Road traffic, in contrast to the adjacent Fairfax Road/Marston Road junction, which prioritises Fairfax Road traffic. This may confuse drivers and create a higher potential for accidents at the Fairfax Road/Edgehill Road junction. Poor visibility for drivers because of parked vehicles and vehicles pulling in/out to park near the junction increases this potential.

Currently parking is often dense in the vicinity of the Fairfax Road/Edgehill Road junction. Many nearby houses lack drives or garages, so vehicles are parked on the road or pavement.

[REDACTED] attracts customers who park their cars briefly while making purchases. Parked vehicles and vehicles pulling in/out may well be contributing to the collisions at the junction.

A new shop, especially one with the interest and attraction of alcohol sales, is likely to increase the density of parked vehicles and vehicles pulling in/out; it would thus increase the risk of road traffic accidents. It would also result in pedestrians lingering around the shop entrance, in danger from potential collisions.

[REDACTED] is in a much safer position – as far as I know, no collisions have been propelled towards that corner of the junction. Because Edgehill Road is one way from roughly south-west to north-east, collisions end up on the north-eastern side of the crossroads, where 46 Fairfax Road is situated.
