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## REPORT OF THE CHILDREN'S STRATEGIC PARTNERSHIP POLICY OFFICER

## SUPPORTING INFORMATION

## 1. Purpose of Report

1.2 The purpose of this report is to inform members of the consultation response to the governments' Green Paper 'Every Child Matters' and summarise the key recommendations within the Paper. Responses have been received from representatives of the Leicester Children's Strategic Partnership.

#### 2. Background

- 2.1 On 8 September 2003 the Government published its Green Paper 'Every Child Matters: a vision for children's services'. The paper is out for consultation until 1 December 2003.
- 2.2 The Green Paper has major implications for the way local authorities run their children's services.
- 2.3 The origin of the Green Paper is the work undertaken in the Home Office on early intervention to prevent offending and anti-social behaviour. A cross-cabinet Committee was formed with representation from each Government Department headed by the Treasure Minister Paul Boateng.
- 2.4 The Paper was also informed by the Cross-Cutting Review on Children at Risk, which was initiated in July 2001 and reported to the Chief Secretary to the Treasury in May

- 2002. This highlighted a number of concerns a lack of a unified vision, fragmentation of services and an imbalance between prevention and crisis intervention.
- 2.5 Three key areas of recommendation emerged from the Review to be picked up by 'Every Child Matters':
  - Delivering sustainable services, including co-location of services, multi-disciplinary teams, common learning and skills
  - Improving the strategic co-ordination of services
  - Filling gaps and improving services, particularly youth services, access to cultural and leisure services, child and adolescent mental health services and family support.
- 2.6 The Green Paper also brings together the Children's Strategy developed by the Children and Young People's Unit, the Government response to Lord Laming's Inquiry Report into the death of Victoria Climbie, and related work on the Education of Looked After Children by the Social Exclusion unit. There are 3 companion papers, 'Youth Justice The Next Steps' from the Home Office, 'Keeping Children Safe' the Government's response to Laming, including the Joint Inspector's report 'Safeguarding Children', and the report of the Social Exclusion Unit, 'A Better Education for Children in Care'.
- 2.7 The Paper sets out a framework for services to *all* children aged 0 to 19 in England.
- 2.8 The Green paper aims to:
  - Ensure no child falls through the net and help every child to achieve their potential
  - Shift the balance towards prevention through tackling child poverty, improving early years education and childcare, raising school standards and supporting parents
  - Ensure services intervene earlier before children reach crisis
- 2.9 It describes a vision of children's services and will measure progress against the outcomes that matter to children:
  - Being health
  - Staying safe
  - Enjoying and achieving
  - Making a positive contribution
  - Economic well-being

### 3. Key Recommendations in The Green Paper

- 3.1 Accountability and Integration.
  - A statutory Director of Children's Services accountable for education and children's social services
  - A lead elected member for children in each local authority
  - A new duty for local authorities, police and health to safeguard children and promote their well-being;
  - A new duty for local authorities to promote the educational achievement of children in care
  - integrating children's services into children's trusts, all authorities to have done this by 2006
  - The creation of Local Safeguarding Children's Boards (statutory successor to ACPCs)
  - Creation of an integrated inspection framework for children's services with Ofsted taking a co-ordinating role
  - a new Children's Commissioner to act as an independent champion for children.

#### 3.2 Supporting Parents.

- The creation of a Parenting Fund of £25m over 3 years
- A Young People's Fund with an initial budget of £200m for activities for children out of school
- 3.3 Early Intervention and effective protection.
  - A single named professional from one agency to be responsible for an individual child's needs
  - Each child is to have a single unique identity number to be used across all agencies
  - The development of a common assessment framework with every local authority appointing a lead officer for information sharing

#### 3.4 Workforce Reform.

- Government proposes to develop a workforce reform strategy, a high profile recruitment campaign and develop flexible and attractive training routes
- Common occupational standards across children's practice and a common core of training for those working with children;

 Proposals for a Children's Workforce Unit based in the DfES which will work with employers, staff and government departments to establish a Sector Skills Council for Children and Young People's Services.

#### 4. Consultation Process

- 4.1 The Green Paper highlights a number of consultation questions at the end of each chapter. Responses are requested by 1 December 2003. Responses should be made using the consultation form provided.
- 4.2 The Government has stated it intends to proceed immediately to legislation in the new parliamentary session. Given such a tight timescale for feedback, it is crucial that local authorities and partner agencies consider their response to the proposals in the Green Paper.
- 4.3 A Regulatory Impact Assessment (RIA) to accompany the proposals contained in this Green Paper has been prepared and is available on the DfES website at: <a href="https://www.dfes.gov.uk/everychildmatters/ria.shtml">www.dfes.gov.uk/everychildmatters/ria.shtml</a>. This will be revised during the course of the consultation to take account of up-to-date information.
- 4.4 The collated consultation responses are shown at **Appendix A**.
