# 1. APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

Apologies were received from Hasu Pragji, (Sure Start), Councillor Sue Waddington, Jim Marshall MP

# 2. <u>LEICESTER CITY COUNCIL BUDGET PROPOSALS</u>

The Chair stated that the meeting had been called to consider the Council's budget proposals and reminded employees of the Council in attendance that under the Council's political conventions they should not speak at this meeting. Due to the very extensive concerns raised in the area restrictions on the meeting had been relaxed to allow non-members to attend.

The Service Director (Lifelong Learning & Community Development) stated that in order to continue the rising standards in schools and meet corporate savings targets it had been necessary to re-prioritise spending within the department. As part of a package of proposals the Corporate Director was proposing to reduce funding to those voluntary groups no longer judged to be meeting core priorities. A consultation process was being undertaken after which the Corporate Director would make his budget recommendations to Cabinet which would then consider these proposals before submitting its recommendations to Council. It was emphasised that the savings listed were proposals and that nothing had been decided upon. He stated that he would be happy to take comments and answer questions but he would not be able to answer questions about specific grants.

Comments were then invited from the floor. Concerns were expressed that the proposals:

- would badly affect women's groups and the Council's strategy was questioned;
- would impact on out of school learning and adult education and so as a result effect school standards and literacy and numeracy targets

- ignored the long tradition in Highfields of delivering services through the community:
- were prepared by officers who did not live in or understand the issues within the area;
- had a disproportionate affect on minority communities and in particular the African Caribbean community;
- had so great an effect on the minority community voluntary sector that an impact study would be required to comply with the Race Relations (Amendment) Act 2000;
- would seriously effect the viability of the voluntary sector which would struggle to find funding for core costs elsewhere and so if the Council wished to use voluntary services in the future they may find it unable to assist;
- withdrew funding from organisations that were assessed and found to meet core priorities as recently as 2003;
- would have a serious impact on community cohesion with it felt that minority communities had been targeted and concerns that the lack of activities could lead to a rise in anti social behaviour;
- had a disproportionate effect on Highfields and so were unfair;
- would seriously impact on other organisations operating in the community which would be unable to fill gaps in provision;
- impacted on the most vulnerable with services for the elderly, children and those in deprived communities suffering;
- would further impact on the community through loss of jobs with many organisations concerned that the funding cut off point would not allow time for statutory redundancy and winding up notice periods;
- would mean that Council would not be able to deliver on its promises to the community for example in regard to the 'Every Child Matters' Green Paper.

It was also felt that the meeting did not constitute consultation and should not be considered as such and suggested that the Council had not considered the true costs of its proposals and that without a coherent case, which had not been made, it had a moral and legal duty to reconsider the proposals. Confusion was also expressed about whether the proposals came from officers or Councillors.

It was stated that with the change in political control the new administration had defined new core priorities which it had passed to Corporate Directors along with corporate savings targets. Officers had prepared draft budgets in consultation with their Cabinet link. Corporate Directors would make their budget recommendations to Cabinet following this period of consultation. The budget would then be put to Council for approval. The proposals aimed to ensure a more even spread of funding to meet need and a re-prioritisation was necessary to ensure adequate funding got to schools to ensure key standards targets were met. Legal advice had been received that an impact assessment under the Race Relations (Amendment) Act was not needed in relation to the proposed changes to voluntary sector funding.

The Chair stated that the three ward Councillors disagreed with the proposals and would be voting against them.

## 3. CLOSE OF MEETING

The meeting closed at 7.05pm.
