Capital Programme 2004/05: Conservation & Heritage Initiatives and Riverside budgets

Report of the Service Director, Environment

1 Purpose of Report

1.1 To seek approval to schemes under the Capital Programme 2004/05

2 Summary

- 2.1 Cabinet approved a three year Capital Programme on 31st January 2002. This included several schemes that were reserved pending further Cabinet approval of details. Two of these were budgets for *Conservation & Heritage Initiatives* and *Riverside* amounting to £165,000 and £150,000 respectively, both over three years.
- 2.2 Details of expenditure against these budgets for 2002/3 and 2003/4 have previously been considered by Cabinet.
- 2.3 The Capital Programme 2004/5 included the final year's planned expenditure of £50,000 for each of these two schemes. Both schemes were categorised as "Pending Further Cabinet Approval" and this paper seeks that approval. Details of expenditure for 2004/05 are set out in the Supporting Information document.

3 Recommendations

- 3.1 Members are recommended to:
 - 1. Approve the schemes set out in the Supporting Information document, and
 - 2. endorse funding from the Capital Programme for these schemes from the *Conservation & Heritage Initiatives* and *Riverside* budgets.

Report

1. Background

- 1.1 Cabinet approved a three year Capital Programme on 31st January 2002. That approval included several schemes reserved for further Cabinet consideration. The reserved schemes included *Conservation & Heritage Initiatives* and *Riverside* budgets amounting to £165,000 and £150,000 respectively, both over three years.
- 1.2 Details of expenditure against these budgets for 2002/3 and 2003/4 have previously been considered by Cabinet. Details of expenditure for 2004/05 are set out below.

2. Riverside Initiatives

- 2.1 The Riverside Capital Programme helps sustain a rolling programme of improvements to Leicester Riverside, It funds a wide variety of environmental and regeneration projects vital to Riverside's development, both directly and in partnership with other agencies. The programme seeks to achieve three key strategic aims:
 - To improve environmental quality
 - To encourage use and enjoyment of the riverside, and
 - To promote regeneration and investment.
- 2.2 The following table summarises the schemes, including those completed in the two years 2002-2004, and underway this year, 2004/05. These projects reflect the Riverside's strategic importance as a catalyst for regeneration, as a wildlife corridor, and as a place for local people and visitors to the City to visit and enjoy.

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3. Conservation Initiatives

- 3.1 In 2002 a budget of £165,000 over 3 years was set aside in the Capital Programme for *Conservation and Heritage Initiatives*: £65,000 in 2002/03 and £50,000 in 2003/04 and 2004/05. This was to be matched by a similar sum from English Heritage as part of a 3 year contract with it to improve the St Georges Conservation Area under a Heritage Economic Regeneration Scheme (HERS). The scheme formed part of a wider commitment to the development of the Cultural Quarter. Broad details of proposals were presented to Cabinet on 5th June 2002.
- 3.2 Property owners have been waiting for more positive signs of the area's regeneration before committing themselves to financial outlay and take-up of grants to improve properties has so far been slow.
- 3.3 Two schemes have been carried out to date.

- 3.4 Work on both of these schemes commenced in 2002/3 and was completed in the current financial year. Both have been highly successful and have been welcomed by officers from English Heritage.
- 3.5 Approximately £94,000 remains unspent from the original budget allocation This is made up of £54,000 from the capital budget (including £4,000 carried forward from last year) and outstanding HERS grant to be paid of £40,000. Several schemes are currently being pursued with property owners. These include improvement schemes for the Secular Hall in Humberstone Gate, 59 Halford Street, 8 Eldon Street and 47 Humberstone Gate. Other schemes may also come forward now that the momentum for regeneration and investment in St. George's is beginning to build.

4. Conclusion

4.1 Investment in relatively small scale improvement schemes in regeneration areas such as the Riverside and St. Georges has an impact well beyond the scope of the individual projects themselves (important though these are). For people living and working in these areas, for visitors from elsewhere in the city and from further afield, and critically for potential developers and other investors they demonstrate a commitment to renewal by the local authority and a vote of confidence in the areas' long term future. As new development begins to take off, it will be important for the authority to continue to play its part in supporting and complementing private sector activity to help ensure the benefits of regeneration are widespread and sustained.
