Please summarise your concerns about this application:

I write in my capacity as a licensing officer for the Leicestershire Police on the authority delegated to me by the Chief Constable.

I am making a representation with regards to the notice by the applicant to hold a temporary event between 19:00hrs Saturday 28th October 2017 until 01:00 Sunday 29th October 2017 as I believe this would undermine the licensing objective of Crime and Disorder and Public Safety due to its location & the time of the event.

These premises are situated within an area of Leicester City that is subject to Leicester City Councils Policy on Cumulative impact.

It is located between 2 of the largest nightclubs within the City with further nightclubs in close proximity.

There are also a number of fast food takeaways that attract late night revellers and queues where friction occurs.

Between the hours of 2300hrs and 0200hrs the area sees an increase in footfall as people move down to the clubs from other areas of the City.

These premises have previously applied for a premises licence in April 2016 which was refused by the Licensing Sub Committee and subsequently following appeal to the Magistrates Court the decision was upheld by the Magistrates.

This area experiences incidents of crime and disorder on a weekly basis connected with the night time economy. Many of these incidents are translated into recorded crimes due to alcohol consumed by either the perpetrator, victim or both.

Those members of the public attending this event would be vulnerable to the actions of intoxicated people and they would increase the amount of vehicular traffic in a confined area at a critical time when public safety may be compromised.

This is also Halloween weekend which will attract an even greater footfall to the clubs as they actively promote special events connected to the festival.

There is no current premises licence and therefore no conditions available to the committee to be placed on the notice to promote the licensing objectives.

Leicestershire Police request that this notice is rejected as it undermines the Licensing Objectives.
