

64. APPOINTMENT OF CHAIR

Councillor Hunter was appointed as Chair for the meeting.

The Chair outlined the procedure for the meeting to be followed and led on introductions.

65. APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

Apologies for absence were received from Councillor Singh Johal. Councillor Pickering was present in place of Councillor Singh Johal.

66. DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

There were no declarations of interest made.

67. APPLICATION FOR A NEW PREMISES LICENCE WITHIN A CUMULATIVE IMPACT ZONE, THE YELLOW DOOR, 34 BELVOIR STREET, LEICESTER, LE1 6QH

The Chair confirmed with the Sub-Committee Members that the reports for the meeting had been read.

The Director of Neighbourhood and Environmental Services submitted a report requiring the Sub-Committee to determine an application for a new premises licence within a Cumulative Impact Zone for The Yellow Door, 34 Belvoir

Street, Leicester, LE1 6QH.

The Sub-Committee noted that representations had been received which necessitated that the application for a new premises licence had to be considered by the Sub-Committee.

The applicant Mr Amritpal Singh Gill was present as was his Solicitor Mr Kulwant Manak. Mr Nigel Rixon (Licensing Manager, Leicestershire Police), PC Jeff Pritchard (Leicestershire Police), Neil Cooper (Environmental Health Officer, Noise Team), Licensing Team Manager (Policy and Applications) and Legal Adviser to the Sub-Committee were also present.

The Licensing Team Manager (Policy and Applications) presented the report and outlined details of the application. It was noted that a representation was received on 18 March 2020 from the Noise Team which related to the licensing objective of the Prevention of Public Nuisance. The Noise Team were concerned that there were previous issues at the premises with noise break out which were resolved through the use of a noise limiter set by the Noise Team.

It was further noted that a representation was received on 1 April 2020 from Leicestershire Police which related to the Prevention of Crime and Disorder, the Prevention of Public Nuisance and Public Safety. The Police were concerned that there were numerous issues at the premises under the previous premises licence resulting in the licence being revoked.

Mr Rixon and PC Pritchard from Leicestershire Police were given the opportunity to outline the reasons for the representation and responded to questions from the Sub-Committee. The Police were concerned that the premises would operate in a similar way to the previous premises including opening until 4am, an hour later than the surrounding premises.

Mr Cooper from the Noise Team was given the opportunity to outline the reasons for the representation and responded to questions from the Sub-Committee. Mr Cooper asked that a condition be added to the licence, if granted, in relation to a noise limiter.

Mr Singh Gill and Mr Manak outlined the reasons for the application and answered questions from Members of the Sub-Committee, Mr Cooper of the Noise Team and the Police.

All parties were then given the opportunity to sum up their positions and make any final comments.

The Sub-Committee received legal advice from the Legal Adviser to the Sub-Committee in the presence of all those present and were advised of the options available to them in making a decision. The Sub-Committee were also advised of the relevant policy and statutory guidance that needed to be taken into account when making their decision.

In reaching their decision, the Sub-Committee felt they should deliberate in

private on the basis that this was in the public interest and as such outweighed the public interest of their deliberation taking place the parties represented present, in accordance with the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005.

The Chair announced that the decision and reasons would be publicly announced and confirmed in writing within five working days. The Chair informed the meeting the Legal Adviser to the Sub-Committee would be called to give advice on the wording of the decision.

The Chair then asked all but the Members of the Sub-Committee and Democratic Support Officers to disconnect from the meeting. The Sub-Committee then deliberated in private to consider their decision.

RESOLVED:

That the application for a new premises licence within a Cumulative Impact Zone for The Yellow Door, 34 Belvoir Street, Leicester, LE1 6QH be REFUSED.

In reaching their decision, members of the Sub-Committee had carefully considered the committee report presented by the Licensing Officer, all representations submitted on behalf of the applicant, the representations from Leicestershire Police and the Council's Noise and Pollution Team and the legal advice given during the hearing.

The Sub-Committee were asked to determine an application for a new premises licence at 34 Belvoir Street Leicester in the Belvoir Street Cumulative Impact Zone. When considering the application, the licensing objectives were of paramount concern. The Sub-Committee considered the application on its own merits and in accordance with the licensing authority's Statement of Licensing Policy and guidance issued under S.182 of the Licensing Act 2003.

The application had been made by Mr Amritpal Singh Gill in accordance with Section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003.

The licensable activities which were the subject of the application were set out in paragraph 5.2 of the Licensing Officer's report to committee.

Representations had been received from the Council's Noise and Pollution Team and Leicestershire Police. The representations engaged 3 of the 4 licensing objectives, namely the Prevention of Crime and Disorder, Public Safety and the Prevention of Public Nuisance.

The Noise and Pollution Team said that the noise nuisance from the premises could only be addressed by using a noise limiting device set at agreed sound levels.

The objection from Leicestershire Police related to the prevention of crime and

disorder and the fact that the premises was situated within a Cumulative Impact Zone and the application did not address these issues. Leicestershire Police had particular concerns about alcohol related violence which they said increased between 3am and 4am and the applicant's ability to manage a surge of customers if premises nearby closed at an earlier time.

The Police said that the licensing objectives would not be met if the premises opened until 4am.

The Police confirmed that engagement by the applicant with them had been good and that the applicant had the best of intentions.

The applicant had in reply asked the Sub-Committee to consider the application on its own merits. The applicant and his representative had offered to alter their operating schedule to meet some of the concerns expressed by the police including offering not to allow admissions to the premises after 3am. The applicant was willing to accept most of the conditions put forward by the Police were the Sub-Committee minded to grant the application.

The Sub-Committee confirmed that they had considered the application on its own merits and subjected the representations made to them by the police to scrutiny and not accepted them at face value.

The Sub-Committee fully considered the issues raised by all parties.

The decision of the Sub-Committee was that it was appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives of the prevention of crime and disorder, public safety and prevention of public nuisance to REFUSE the application.

REASONS FOR THE DECISION

It was the view of the Sub-Committee that the applicant had failed to demonstrate that the grant of the licence (even with conditions) would be unlikely to add to the existing problems of cumulative impact in the area. When questioned by the Sub-Committee neither the applicant nor his representative was able to demonstrate an appreciation or understanding that the premises for which a licence was applied for was within the Belvoir Street Cumulative Impact Zone and accordingly failed to put forward in the operating schedule, or indeed before the Sub-Committee any material which would demonstrate that the grant of a licence would be unlikely to add to the problems of cumulative impact on Belvoir Street.


The applicant had failed to satisfy the Sub-Committee in his representations before them or in the Operating Schedule that he would promote the licensing objectives particularly the licensing objective of prevention of crime and disorder. The Sub-Committee accepted the representations made to them by the Police regarding the increase in alcohol related violence between the hours of 3am and 4am and they were not satisfied by the responses given to them by the applicant regarding the management of customers who in all likelihood would surge to the premises following closure of licensed premises nearby.

The Sub-Committee were also not satisfied by the arrangements for door security proposed by the applicant. In their opinion, the applicant had not fully grasped what was required to promote the licensing objectives in the location within the Belvoir Street Cumulative Impact Zone which had a long history, not confined to the previous owners, of alcohol related violence and anti-social behaviour.

The applicant would be advised of their right to appeal to the Magistrates Court within 21 days of the decision.

Councillor Hunter was appointed as Chair for the meeting.

The Chair outlined the procedure for the meeting to be followed and led on introductions.

70. APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

Apologies were received from Mr Sean Jarvis, Leicestershire County Cricket Club.

71. DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

Members were asked to declare any interests they may have in the business to be discussed on the agenda.

No declarations of interest were made.

72. MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING

RESOLVED:

that the minutes of the meetings held on 12th March 2020 and 24th April 2020 be confirmed as a correct record.

73. APPLICATION FOR A NEW PREMISES LICENCE: LEICESTERSHIRE COUNTY CRICKET CLUB, COUNTY GROUND, GRACE ROAD, LEICESTER

The Chair confirmed with Sub-Committee Members that the reports for the

meeting had been read.

The Director of Neighbourhood and Environmental Services submitted a report requiring the Sub-Committee to determine an application for a new premises licence for Leicestershire County Cricket Club, County Ground, Grace Road, Leicester.

The Sub-Committee noted that representations had been received which necessitated that the application for the new premises licence had to be considered by the Sub-Committee.

Ms Sandra Clark (Stadium Manager) was present. Mr Nigel Rixon (Licensing Manager, Leicestershire Police), Mr Robin Marston (Noise Team, Leicester City Council), Mr Steven Dukes (Resident), Licensing Team Manager (Enforcement) who had made representation, Licensing Team Manager (Policy and Applications) and Legal Adviser to the Sub-Committee were also present.

The Licensing Team Manager (Policy and Applications) presented the report and outlined details of the application. It was noted that representations had been received from Responsible Authorities, Leicestershire Police, The Noise Team and the Licensing Authority. The representations related to all four licensing objectives and all had reached agreements with the applicant.

It was further noted that a representation was received on 18th March 2020 from a local resident. The representation related to the licensing objectives of the prevention of public nuisance and the protection of children from harm. The local resident was concerned that the events would cause noise nuisance and disruption to local residents and would be particularly unacceptable on weekdays.

Mr Rixon for Leicestershire Police was given the opportunity to outline the reasons for the representation. It was noted the Police had had discussions with the applicant and had no concerns as the applicant had agreed to requests from the police. The Police supported the application.

The Licensing Team Manager (Enforcement) outlined the reasons for the representation and answered questions from Members and the local resident. It was noted the opinion considered by the authority who had previous experience of joint working the applicant, that if the Sub-Committee were minded to grant the application and following agreement with the applicant, that the requested conditions detailed in the representation be imposed in full.

Mr Marston (Noise Team) outlined the details for the representation. It was noted that discussions had been held with the club, and requested conditions detailed in the report had been agreed.

Mr Dukes (local resident) outlined the detail for the representation. Mr Dukes raised concerns over noise levels and request they be lowered, holding events on consecutive days including week-days, the time at night the concerts would cease, traffic and parking. He requested the cricket ground provide details to

local residents on events, noise levels and traffic plans.

Ms Clarke on behalf of the cricket club responded to points made and answered questions from Members, Mr Dukes and the Legal Adviser to the Sub Committee.

All parties were then given the opportunity to sum up their positions and make any final comments.

The Sub-Committee received legal advice from the Legal Adviser to the Sub-Committee in the presence of all those present and were advised of the options available to them in making a decision. The Sub-Committee were also advised of the relevant policy and statutory guidance that needed to be taken into account when making their decision.

In reaching their decision, the Sub-Committee felt they should deliberate in private on the basis that this was in the public interest and as such outweighed the public interest of their deliberation taking place with the parties represented present, in accordance with the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005.

The Chair announced that the decision and reasons would be publicly announced and confirmed in writing within five working days. The Chair informed the meeting the Legal Adviser to the Sub-Committee would be called to give advice on the wording of the decision.

The Chair then asked all but the Members of the Sub-Committee and Democratic Support Officers to disconnect from the meeting. The Sub-Committee then deliberated in private to consider their decision.

RESOLVED:

That the application for a new Premises Licence for Leicestershire County Cricket Club, County Ground, Grace Road, Leicester be GRANTED subject to the conditions consistent with the Operating Schedule, and conditions consistent with representations from the Licensing Enforcement Team, Noise Team and Leicestershire Police as detailed in Appendix C to the Officer's report.

The Sub-Committee had been asked to determine an application for a new Premises Licence. In reaching their decision the Sub-Committee Members had listened carefully to all of the representations and took account of the Statutory Guidance, the Regulators' Code and the Council's Licensing Policy.

The Sub-Committee heard that the Cricket Club had a history of cooperating fully with responsible authorities. It also had a history of successfully holding music events, in particular, a large-scale event in 2016.

The Sub-Committee were informed representations had been received from Leicestershire Police, the Council's Licensing Enforcement Manager and the

Council's Noise Team on all four of the licensing objectives. Following agreement with the Cricket Club on conditions to be attached to the licence if granted, those representations were now in favour of the grant of the licence.


The Sub-Committee were further informed of an outstanding single representation made by a local resident regarding the prevention of public nuisance arising from crowd noise, increased parking in the area and loud music, and the protection of children from harm arising from potential harm to their sleep patterns as a result of noise.

REASON FOR THE DECISION

The Sub-Committee stated that the additional conditions agreed by the Cricket Club with the Police and the appropriate Council authorities addressed issues raised in the representation of the local resident effectively, and were appropriate for promotion of the licensing objectives.

There being no other items of urgent business, the meeting closed at 11.29am.



3. Summary

- 3.1 This report outlines an application for a variation to an existing premises licence for La Lory, 8 Humberstone Road, Leicester and summarises the representations received. It also highlights the licensing objectives, the relevant parts of the guidance and regulations, and the pertinent sections of the Licensing Authority's Licensing Policy.

5. Existing Licence

5.1. The existing licence is attached at Appendix A.

6. Application

6.1. An application was received on 11th March 2020 from Chris Nixon at Knight Training acting on behalf of Another World Ltd for a variation to an existing premises licence for La Lory, 8 Humberstone Road, Leicester. A copy of the application is attached at Appendix B.

The variation sought by the application is as follows:

- To remove the condition the licence holder will fit and maintain a CCTV system in accordance with the direction of Leicestershire Constabulary Crime Prevention Officer.
- To remove the condition the licence holder will adopt a challenge 21 system.
- To remove the condition for a noise limiting device to be installed, fitted and maintained in such a manner as to control all sources of amplified music at the premises. The level set on the limited shall be agreed by Leicester City Council Noise Team.

7. Steps to Promote the Licensing Objectives

- 7.1 The steps the applicant proposes to take to promote the licensing objectives are set out in the operating schedule (see section M of Appendix B).
- 7.2 In arriving at its decision on the application, the Licensing Authority's primary consideration must be the promotion of the licensing objectives.

8. Regulated entertainment

- 8.1 The Live Music Act 2012 and the Legislative Reform (Entertainment Licensing) Order 2014 amended the Licensing Act 2003 in relation to the provision of regulated entertainment. Certain entertainment does not require a licence subject to audience limits, between 08.00 and 23.00 hours each day.
- 8.2 The above exemptions may affect the application under consideration because conditions may not be imposed at this stage to control live or recorded music that is unregulated. However, if problems do occur as a result of that entertainment then conditions may be imposed to control such music in the future after a formal review.

9. Representation

- 9.1 A representation was received on the 2nd April 2020 from the Licensing Manager at Leicestershire Police. The representation relates to the prevention of crime and disorder and the prevention of public nuisance. The Police have expressed concerns about the close proximity of the premises to the city centre and the potential disturbance to neighbouring residential premises. They have also expressed concerns regarding how the applicant plans to operate and links to a neighbouring premises, which is also owned by the licence holder. A copy of the representation is attached at Appendix C.
- 9.2 A representation was received on the 3rd April 2020 from the Noise and Pollution Control Team at Leicester City Council. The representation relates to the prevention of public nuisance. The Noise Team have expressed concerns that by extending the premises over an additional floor, therefore increasing the capacity of the premises and the increase in

trading hours then this would cause an increase in noise disturbances, which would have a negative effect on existing residential properties. They have also raised concerns regarding the request to remove the condition on the licence to remove the noise limiter which was requested by the noise team when the licence was originally. The noise team requests that this not only remains but it extended to include the first floor. A copy of the representation is attached at Appendix C.1.

10. Conditions

- 10.1 The conditions that are consistent with the operating schedule are attached at Appendix D. All objectors have recommended refusal however if granted the Police have requested a number of conditions be imposed in addition to all of those detailed within the application. The Noise Team have also requested that if granted the noise limiter in place remains and is extended to include the 1st floor now covered by the licence.

11. Statutory Guidance

May I take this opportunity to remind you that Section 57 of the Licensing Act 2003 states;

- a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to-
 - i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supplied alcohol), or
 - ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
- b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
- e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).

The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.

The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.

The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.

The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either-

- a) a holographic mark, or
- b) an ultraviolet feature.

The responsible person shall ensure that-

- a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures-
 - i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
 - ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
- b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
- c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.



- Notwithstanding this condition customers are permitted to take from the premises part consumed and resealed bottles of wine supplied ancillary to their meal;
- Notwithstanding this condition customers are permitted to be sold or supplied alcohol at the bar, while waiting to be seated

b) The prevention of crime and disorder

A camera CCTV system is in place covering all public areas of the premises enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition

The CCTV system shall continuously record whilst the premises is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises. All recordings will be stored for a minimum of 31 days and can be accessed and downloaded immediately when requested by the police or other authorised officer

There will always be at least one person present whilst the premises is open to the public who is able to operate and download images from the CCTV

An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available on request to the police or an authorised officer, which will record the following:

- All crimes reported to the venue;
- Any complaints received;
- Any incidents of disorder;
- Any faults in the CCTV system;
- Any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service;
- All ejections of patrons;
- All seizures of drugs or offensive weapons ;
- Any refusal of the sale of alcohol

c) Public safety

- The premises will be maintained in a safe manner at all times
- All exits will be kept unobstructed, easy to open and clearly signed

d) The prevention of public nuisance

 Any artificial lighting on the premises must not cause nuisance due to glare unless it is considered necessary by the local Police force to prevent crime and disorder
 The licensee shall endeavour to ensure that there are no noxious smells emitted from the licensed premises so as to cause a nuisance to nearby properties and that the licensed premises is properly vented

e) The protection of children from harm

A Challenge 25 proof of age scheme shall be operated at the premises where the only acceptable forms of ID are recognised photographic identification cards, such as a driving licence, passport or proof of age card with the PASS hologram
 The premises will operate a "No ID, No Sale" policy at all times for persons who look under 25
 Staff will be trained in the understanding of this policy and training records maintained for inspection if requested by the police or any other responsible authority
 A record shall be kept detailing all refused sales of alcohol. The record should include the date and time of the refused sale and the name of the member of staff who refused the sale. 



<p>I write in my capacity as Licensing Manager for Leicestershire Police on the authority delegated to me by the Chief Constable.</p> <p>The current application if granted would undermine the licensing objectives in relation to the prevention of crime and disorder and the prevention of public nuisance.</p> <p>My representation to this variation for an existing licensed premises is based upon the licensing objectives.</p> <p>This application has been submitted in order to increase the licensable area of an existing licensed premises, increase the permitted licensable activity hours and increase the permitted hours that the premises can open to the public. The premises has recently re-opened after</p>

being closed for some time. During the closure period, the premises has undergone a refurbishment.

The current licence permits the premises to open to the public on the following:

Sunday – Thursday 5am until 12:20am

Friday & Saturday 5am until 2:20am.

The current licence permits the premises to supply alcohol and late night refreshment for consumption both ON & OFF the premises on the following:

Sunday – Thursday 11am until 12:20am.

Friday & Saturday 11am until 2am.

The current licence permits the performance of live music (indoors) on the following:

Sunday – Thursday 11am until midnight.

Friday & Saturday 11am until 2am.

The current licence permits the playing of recorded music (indoors):

Sunday – Thursday 9am until midnight.

Friday & Saturday 9am until 2am.

Therefore, the applicant wishes to extend the following:

(1) Late night refreshment.

Extend daily (Monday to Sunday) from 11pm until 5am.

Sunday – Thursday = 4 hour and 40 minute increase.

Friday & Saturday = 3 hour increase.

(2) Supply of alcohol.

Extend daily (Monday to Sunday) from 7am until 4:30am.

Sunday – Thursday = 4 hour and 10 minute increase.

Friday & Saturday = 3 hours increase.

(3) Hours that premises is open to the public.

Extend daily (Monday to Sunday) from midnight to midnight.

Sunday – Thursday = 4 hour and 40 minute increase.

Friday & Saturday = 2 hour and 40 minute increase.

(4) Increase the size of the licensable area by incorporating the first floor into the licensable area of the premises.

Location & Surrounding Area.

The premises is owned by a couple who have owned the business for a period of time.

The premises is located at 8 Humberstone Road, LE5 0AR. Despite the postcode, the address is located within the Leicester city inner ring road (LE1 post code area) near to Wharf Street South, Rutland Street and Wimbledon Street. The premises is located opposite a derelict building formally known as the “International Hotel”.

The premises is situated on the edge of the city centres late night time economy.

Another licensed premises is located next door called “Altro Mondo” and operates as an Italian restaurant. The restaurant’s address is 10-12 Humberstone Road. Altro Mondo has

unrestricted opening hours but is only permitted to carry out licensable activity on Monday to Saturday between 10am until 2am and on Sunday from midday until 2am.

Adana (Turkish restaurant) which is not licensed is located at 14-16 Humberstone Road. Humberstone Supermarket which is also not licensed is located 18-20 Humberstone Road.

A number of other shops are located along the same side of the road as the premises up until the junction of Clyde Street.

During an initial inspection, there appears to be some first and second floor residential accommodation above all of the above mentioned premises. There are several large residential blocks containing flats a short distance away bordering Wimbledon Street, Humberstone Road and Morledge Street.

The premises currently operates as a Romanian and Greek restaurant of which only the ground floor is presently licensed. By licensing the first floor, it will effectively double the size and capacity of the premises but also provide an area for private parties/functions.

The applicant also owns the property next door at 8A Humberstone Road. The business operates as a massage parlour known as Club 8A. Club 8A is accessed via a flight of stairs from street level to the right hand side of the restaurant as you look at the premises from the street. There is a security gate at the top of the stairs controlling access and egress to and from the massage parlour. On entry into the massage parlour there is a reception area with several settees, a bar area and a stand-alone fridge containing non-alcoholic drinks.

In 2019 Club 8A, which is not a licensed premises, was suspected to have been supplying alcohol to customers.

History

In the early hours of Sunday 30th June 2019, police officers attended the premises to conduct a licensing visit as intelligence was received that the premises was selling alcohol to customers using the massage parlour despite not having a licence to do so. The attending officers described how they rang the doorbell, as the security gate at the top of the stairs prevented them entry, at which point they could hear what was described as the furious sound of glass bottles clinking from inside. The officers were allowed entry by a male who gave his details as – Andrew Kyracou, the owner and applicant.

PC3028 Apps stated that Mr Kyracou looked nervous and on entering the first floor reception area there was a bar area that had a number of bottles of beer hidden in boxes behind the bar area.

PC3028 Apps suspected alcohol was either being sold or given away to customers at the premises.

Given the events of Sunday 17th November 2019, there is a strong possibility that the victim and alleged suspect had both been consuming alcohol on the premises and this may be the reason why the manager/applicant was distancing himself from the incident.

On Wednesday 18th December 2019, a multi-agency licensing visit was conducted to the premises but no offences were identified.

Crime & disorder associated to the premises
Sunday 17th November 2019 @ 03:01 hours.

Assault whereby occasioning actual bodily harm allegation (ABH)

Crime Number 19000615944

The victim states he was inside Club 8A, 8A Humberstone Road, Leicester along with the suspect who is known to him. The victim states he had consumed alcohol and that the suspect was intoxicated when he assaulted him outside the premises by punching him to the face four of five times.

The officer in the case contacted the premises to make enquiries about CCTV opportunities and was later contacted by the manager of the club who stated he was aware of the incident, however none of the men involved were customers or had been in the club. The manager stated that he didn't witness any assault, although he was able to tell the investigating officer "The guy who called you was aggressive and his friends were trying to calm him down".

The investigating officer suspected that the manager was attempting to deflect attention away from the premises and did not want the officer to check his CCTV system, as it might have been detrimental to his business.

The victim later withdrew his complaint after discrepancies in his account including admitting that he had removed his own belt in order to "defend himself".

Meeting with the applicant

On Friday 27th March 2020, PC2093 Pritchard acting in his role as Leicester City Centre Licensing Officer for Leicestershire Police met the applicant at the premises to discuss the application in person.

During the meeting the applicant discussed his business intentions, however it quickly became apparent that the applicant's intentions were different to what was detailed in the submitted operating schedule.

The applicant stated that he would permit customers to consume alcohol only on the premises and would permit beer and other alcoholic drinks to be taken off the premises and supplied to his adjoining business premises of Club 8A.

The applicant stated that the business aims to cater for private parties including Romanian celebrations and that the extended hours would cater for this demand, as it is common for these types of celebrations not to start until later and to continue into the early hours.

However, it is noted that the applicant has not applied to amend / increase the hours for live or recorded music in order to mirror the opening hours for such parties as you would expect, which seems odd and would suggest the alcohol consumption will be the primary focus after midnight on Sunday to Thursday and after 2am on Friday and Saturday.

The internal layout of the premises, including the first floor extension was inspected by PC2093 Pritchard. PC Pritchard noted an internal wooden link door which links the first floor area of the restaurant to the reception area of Club 8A. The applicant stated that this door would be locked whilst open to the public.

The applicant was asked how the 'off sales' of alcohol would operate. The applicant stated that customers would be permitted to buy alcohol including beer and take it off the premises. The applicant also stated that he would supply and deliver alcohol himself to customers using Club 8A.

In conclusion:

As the premises is seeking to increase its size by licensing the first floor area, this will effectively double the capacity of the premises. This effectively increases the likelihood of crime, disorder, anti-social behaviour and public nuisance associated to the premises. I do not believe the increase in capacity alone is sufficient to object; however as the applicant wishes to remain open to the public daily until 5am, with alcohol being served daily until 4:30am, this does raise concern. As other licensable activity including the playing of live and recorded music remains unchanged from the existing permitted hours, thus midnight or 2am dependant on the day of the week, it would strongly suggest that the alcohol consumption would become the primary function of the premises after the music has finished. The premises would cease to operate primarily as a restaurant / private hire area and become an alcohol led stand up bar with alcohol as the only licensable activity.

As alcohol fuelled violent crime increases significantly late at night and into the early of the morning, more so at weekends given the longer periods that customers are permitted to consume alcohol, it would inevitably result in increased crime and disorder at the premises regardless of the applicants good intentions and ability to manage its customers.

The premises proximity to nearby existing residential flats could potentially result in an increase in public nuisance as customers disperse from the premises in the early hours of the morning.

As the premises does not have a designated enclosed external smoking area, it ultimately means that customers will smoke cigarettes and vape E-cigarettes on the pavement area to the front of the premises, resulting in increased noise and disruption to local residents.

Customers smoking to the front of the premises in the early hours of the morning could result in increased crime and disorder as other revellers in the night time economy, already under the influence of alcohol, exit the city centre and come into contact with the customers smoking outside.

Given the premises position on a main footfall and vehicle thoroughfare into the city centre, it could result in it becoming a 'stopping off point' for customers already under the influence of alcohol, wishing to seek another alcoholic beverage as they exit the city centre in the early hours of the morning.

Leicestershire Police believe that the application effectively fails to address two out of the four licensing objectives in terms of:

- (1) The prevention of crime and disorder.
- (2) The prevention of public nuisance.

Leicestershire Police respectfully requests that the committee refuses the application. However, if the committee choose to grant the licence, Leicestershire Police would ask that they consider attaching the following conditions to the licence in order to promote the licensing objectives.

- (1) No alcoholic drinks purchased on the premises can be removed from the premises with the exception of partly consumed or resealed bottles of wine supplied and which are ancillary to a substantial table meal.

- (2) The supply of alcohol to be limited to:
Sunday to Wednesday from 11am to 1am.
Thursday from 11am to 1:30am.
Friday & Saturday from 11am to 2:30am.
- (3) The hours that the premises are open to the public to be limited to an additional 30 minutes after the supply of alcohol ceases.
- (4) Customers will not be permitted to congregate immediately outside the front of the premises.

<p>The premises is located on Humberstone Road directly adjacent to residential flats at 10 Humberstone Road and behind Block E, Clyde Court, Erskine Street containing 15 residential units. It is by nature a lively area where higher ambient noise is expected, however this significantly drops at night, particularly after 02:00 hours.</p> <p>Opening hours are to extend daily (Monday to Sunday) from 00:00 – 00:00 hours. This would increase the detriment to the above residential properties from customers inside the premises and when entering and exiting. This is exacerbated with the extension of the licensable area to the first floor.</p> <p>Recorded Music hours are to remain the same 23:00 - 00:00 hours Sunday to Thursday, and 23:00 – 02:00 hours Friday & Saturday. Extending the licensable area to the first floor will increase the detriment to the adjacent first floor residential property from Recorded Music.</p> <p>Supply of Alcohol 23:00 hours - 05:00 hours is to be extended which will increase the existing ambient noise level from within the premises, as well as an increase in noise</p>

when entering and exiting the premises. This is again exacerbated by extending the licensable area to the first floor.

Extending the licensable area to the first floor also increases the overall capacity of the premises. With the increase in capacity there will be an increase in the overall noise level, for example conversations, singing and chanting. This also applies to the increase of customers congregating on the pavement while smoking/vaping due to the lack of a designated smoking area.

Upon discussing the application with a representative of the applicant from Knight Training, the main reason for extending the opening hours, Late Night Refreshment Hours and Supply of Alcohol is for private functions such as birthday parties. With these events typically comes higher noise levels again exacerbated by the increased capacity and extended hours.

I was also made aware of the new extraction system that has been installed for which the applicant intends to submit a retrospective planning application. The proposed hours of Late Night Refreshment of 23:00 – 05:00 hours raises concern as we have to assume the flue will be operating throughout those hours. Additionally, without planning details of the extraction flue, the detriment to the nearby residential units cannot be assessed fully.

I am also concerned about the current level of sound insulation the building provides as this would not have been designed to take out music or noise from large groups of people.

There is also a request for removal of the condition concerning the noise limiting device previously set by the Leicester City Council Noise Team. This condition was requested to protect the local residents and as such we would not only want this retained but extended to include the first floor.

In summary, based on the above, I recommend the committee refuse the application as it does not effectively address the licensing objective for the Prevention of Public Nuisance.

CONDITIONS

CONDITIONS CONSISTENT WITH OPERATING SCHEDULE
The licence holder will ensure the premises is run as a restaurant in which, when a sale or supply of alcohol is made for consumption on the premises customers are shown to their table.
The licence holder will ensure the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises is by waiter or waitress service only.
The licence holder will ensure that they provide food in the form of substantial table meals that are prepared on the premises and are served and consumed at the table using non disposable crockery.
The licence holder will ensure that where alcohol shall not be sold or supplied, otherwise than for consumption by persons who are seated in the premises and taking substantial table meals there, and provided that the consumption of alcohol by such persons in ancillary to taking such meals.
The licence holder will ensure that customers are only permitted to take from the premises part consumed and resealed bottles of wine supplied ancillary to their meal.
The licence holder will ensure that customers are permitted to be sold or supplied alcohol at the bar, while waiting to be seated.
The licence holder will ensure that a camera CCTV system is in place covering all public areas of the premises enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition.
The licence holder will ensure the CCTV system shall continuously record whilst the premises is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises. All recordings will be stored for a minimum of 31 days and can be accessed and downloaded immediately when requested by the police or other authorised officer.
The licence holder will ensure there will always be at least one person present whilst the premises is open to the public who is able to operate and download images from the CCTV.
The licence holder will ensure an incident log shall be kept on the premises and made available on request to the police or an authorised officer. The log will record all crimes reported to the venue, any complaints received, any incidents of disorder, any faults in the CCTV system, any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service, all ejections of patrons, all seizure of drugs or offensive weapons and any refusal of the sale of alcohol.
The licence holder will ensure that the premises will always be maintained in a safe manner.

CONDITIONS

The licence holder will ensure that all exits will be kept unobstructed, easy to open and clearly signed.
The licence holder will ensure the proper maintenance of all escape routes and exits including external exits. This will require such exits are kept unobstructed, in good order with non-slippery and even surfaces, free of trip hazards and clearly identified.
The licence holder will ensure that all refuse is disposed of in an appropriate manner and staff will keep all external areas in a clean and presentable manner at all times.
The licence holder will ensure notices are displayed asking patrons to leave the premises quietly and to have respect for local residents.
The licence holder will ensure substantial food and non-intoxicating beverages, including drinking water, shall be available in all parts of the premises where alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises.
The licence holder will ensure that no deliveries to the premises shall take place between 23:00 hours and 07:00 hours the following day.
The licence holder will ensure no waste or recyclable materials, including bottles shall be moved, removed from or placed in outside areas between 23:00 hours and 07:00 hours on the following day.
The licence holder will ensure all external doors and windows must be kept closed, other than access and egress, after 22:00 daily in all rooms when events involving amplified music or speech shall be relayed via external speakers.
The licence holder will ensure reasonable steps are taken to prevent public nuisance being caused by customers outside whilst smoking. Should customers be found loitering outside, staff will be required to encourage them to move on.
The licence holder will ensure any artificial lighting on the premises must not cause nuisance due to glare unless it is considered necessary by the local police force to prevent crime and disorder.
The licence holder will ensure that there are no noxious smells emitted from the licensed premises that could cause a nuisance to nearby properties and that the licensed premises is properly vented.
The licence holder will ensure a challenge 25 proof of age scheme shall be operated at the premises, where the only acceptable forms of ID are recognised photographic identification cards, such as driving licence, passport or proof of age card with the pass hologram.
The licence holder will ensure that the premises operates a No ID, No sale policy at all times for persons who look under 25. Staff will be trained in the understanding of this policy and training record maintained for inspection, if requested by the police or an authorised officer of the council at all times whilst the premises is open.

CONDITIONS

The licence holder will ensure after 21:00 hours daily all persons under the age of 18 shall be accompanied by an adult.

CONDITIONS CONSISTENT WITH THE REPRESENTATION FROM THE POLICE

No alcoholic drinks purchased on the premises can be removed from the premises apart from partially consumed or resealed bottles of wine supplied and which are ancillary to a substantial table meal.

The supply of alcohol be limited to Sunday to Wednesday from 11am to 1am, Thursday from 11am to 1:30am, Friday & Saturday 11am to 2:30am.

The hours that the premises are open to the public be limited to an additional 30 minutes after the supply of alcohol ceases.

Customers will not be permitted to congregate immediately outside the front of the premises.

The noise limiting device previously set by the Leicester City Council Noise Team is retained but also extended to include the first floor.
