1. APPOINTMENT OF CHAIR

Councillor Singh Johal was appointed as Chair for the meeting.

The Chair led on introductions and the procedure for the meeting.

2. APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

6. APPLICATION FOR A REVIEW OF AN EXISTING PREMISES LICENCE

The Director of Neighbourhood and Environmental Services submitted a report on an application for the review of an existing premises licence.

The Premises Licence Holder (PLH) / Designated Premises Supervisor (DPS) was present, accompanied by his wife and a translator provided by Leicester City Council. Mr David Braithwaite, Deputy Licensing Manager for Leicestershire Police was present accompanied by Ms Minaxi Patel, Trading Standards Officer, Neighbourhood and Environmental Services. Also present was the Licensing Team Manager (Policy and Applications) and the Legal Adviser to the Sub-Committee.

The Licensing Team Manager (Policy and Applications) presented the report. It was noted a review application was received on 15 September 2021 from Leicestershire Police on the grounds of the prevention of crime and disorder, public safety and the protection of children from harm. It was further noted that representations from 18 patrons of the store were received between 19-28 September 2021 in support of the premises.

Mr Braithwaite was given the opportunity to outline the details of the Police representation and answered questions from Members.

Ms Patel was given the opportunity to outline the details of the report from Trading Standards in support of the Police representation and answered questions from Members.

The PLH/DPS through the translator and his wife was given the opportunity to address the Sub-Committee and answered questions from the Police, Trading Standards Officer and Members.

The meeting was adjourned at 11.24am for a five-minute comfort break.

On reconvening, all parties present were then given the opportunity to sum up

their positions and make any final comments.

The Sub-Committee received legal advice from the Legal Adviser to the Sub-Committee in the presence of all those present and were advised of the options available to them in making their decision. The Sub-Committee were also advised of the relevant policy and statutory guidance that needed to be taken into account when making their decision.

In reaching their decision, Members felt they should deliberate in private on the basis that this was in the public interest, and as such outweighed the public interest of their deliberation taking place with the parties represented present, in accordance with the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005.

The Chair announced that the decision and reasons would be publicly announced in writing within five working days. The Chair informed the meeting that the Legal Adviser to the Sub-Committee would be called back to give advice on the wording of the decision.

The Chair then informed the meeting that all but the Democratic Support Officers should withdraw from the room. The Sub-Committee then deliberated in private to consider their decision.

The Sub-Committee recalled the Legal Adviser to the Sub-Committee to give advice on the wording of the decision.

RESOLVED:

That the premises licence be REVOKED.

In reaching their decision, Members of the Sub-Committee carefully considered the committee report presented by the Licensing Team Manager (Policy and Applications), all representations made by Leicestershire Police in support of the Application for a Review, the report from the Trading Standards Officer, the representation made by the PLH/DPS and the legal advice given during the hearing.

The Sub-Committee had been asked to determine an application for the review of the premises licence. When considering the application, the licensing objectives were of paramount concern. The Sub-Committee considered the review application on its own merits and in accordance with the licensing authority's Statement of Licensing Policy and statutory guidance issued under S.182 of the Licensing Act 2003.

The current licensable activities which were the subject of the review were set out in paragraph 5.2 of Licensing report presented to the Sub-Committee.

Members were informed Leicestershire Police made an application to review the premises licence on the basis that the PLH/DPS had failed to promote the licensing objectives of the prevention of crime and disorder, public safety and the protection of children from harm due to:

• Illegal cigarettes and tobacco being found on the premises on 2nd May 2020, 22nd May 2020 and over a year later a large amount being found on

- 17th August 2021
- Boxes of Nitrous Oxide being found on the premises on the same dates 2nd May 2020, 22nd May 2020 and 17th August 2021
- In addition, on 17th August 2021 49 unlicensed Sildenafil Citrate tablets were found at the premises

The Sub-Committee was informed that the police visit to the premises on 17th August 2021 was prompted following intelligence received on 9th July 2021 which stated that the owner of the premises was selling alcohol and cigarettes to children. It was also noted that some of the cigarettes being sold were illegal.

The Sub-Committee was further informed that following the discovery of the illegal cigarettes and tobacco at the premises, the Police visited the PLH/DPS's other licensed premises where they found 205 boxes of illegal cigarettes and tobacco.

The review application was supported by three witness statements from Police Officers, a witness statement from the Council's Trading Standards officer and two statements from the Medicines and Healthcare products Regulatory Agency (MHRA).

The PLH/DPS attended the hearing together with his wife. An interpreter had been arranged for the hearing however the PLH/DPS preferred to make his representation through his wife and the interpreter was subsequently discharged.

The Sub-Committee heard the PLH/DPS opposed the grounds for review. He had not disputed the presence of illegal cigarettes and tobacco at both licensed premises nor did he dispute the presence of the boxes of Nitrous Oxide or the 49 unlicensed tablets of Sildenafil Citrate. During the hearing he stated that all of the cigarettes and tobacco found at both premises were for his personal use and that he kept them under the counter at both premises because he had limited storage space. He stated that he could not store them at home as his wife did not want them there and they got into arguments about his smoking.

The PLH/DPS repeatedly denied knowing that the cigarettes and tobacco he had purchased from a man visiting his shop were illegal despite the packaging being completely different from UK packaging and despite the packages being marked with stickers such as 'only for sale in Ghana'. The PLH/DPS did not think it strange that he was paying £1 to £2 per box when the UK price was upwards of £10, and this was despite the PLH/DPS going to wholesalers on a weekly basis to buy cigarettes which were compliant with UK regulations.

In relation to the boxes of Nitrous Oxide, the PLH/DPS stated that these were for legitimate catering purposes and that he required customers to sign a disclaimer to this effect on each occasion a purchase was made. He also stated that the Police had not removed all of boxes of Nitrous Oxide and that their presence on subsequent visits was from the original order. The Sub-Committee were further informed the Sildenafil Citrate tablets belonged to a friend who had left them in his premises.

The Sub-Committee heard that letters in support of the PLH/DPS had been submitted from 18 customers, many of whom vouched for the level of service provided by the PLH/DPS and the support he provided to the local community. Three letters from customers referred to the strict procedures adopted by the PLH/DPS to prevent underage sales of alcohol and cigarettes. Customers also referred to the PLH/DPS suffering hardship through burglaries and loss of money.

The Sub-Committee Members confirmed that they had not taken anything put before them on face value and had spent a great deal of time scrutinising the evidence in detail and with due rigour. Members had carefully considered each of the options available to them as outlined during the hearing.

As a result of what the Sub-Committee heard, it was satisfied that the representations by the Police engaged three of the four licensing objectives and it concluded that it was appropriate and proportionate in light of licensing objectives to REVOKE the licence

REASONS FOR THE DECISION

- 1. The Sub-Committee believed that the cause or causes of the concerns which gave rise to the application for review was the discovery of illegal cigarettes and tobacco, Nitrous Oxide cannisters and unlicensed Sildenafil Citrate tablets.
- 2. The Sub-Committee accepted the evidence of the Trading Standards Officer to the effect that cigarettes and tobacco found at both premises were illegal due to UK duty not being paid and due to the products not complying with the Tobacco and Related Products Regulations 2016 and the Standardised Packaging of Tobacco Regulations 2015. The Sub-Committee acknowledged the impact of counterfeit cigarettes and tobacco on public health and to the involvement of organised crime in its supply.
- 3. The Sub-Committee had taken note of the intelligence report dated 9th July 2021 stating that alcohol and cigarettes were being sold to children and that illegal cigarettes were being sold. The Sub-Committee found no direct evidence regarding sale of those items to those underage and noted the information from three customers stating that they had witnessed the PLH/DPS adopting strict procedures to prevent underage sales of alcohol and cigarettes. However, the intelligence report regarding illegal cigarettes was proved true when the police visited the premises on 17th August 2021 and the PLH/DPS's other premises on 14th September 2021.
- 4. The Sub-Committee did not believe the PLH/DPS when he stated that he did not know that the cigarettes and tobacco which he purchased from a man coming to his shop were illegal. The Sub-Committee found that illegal cigarettes and tobacco were being stored at both premises.

- 5. The Sub-Committee did not accept that 7246 cigarettes comprising 30 different brands could have been for the PLH/DPS's personal use.
- 6. Having carefully evaluated all of the information and evidence before it, the Sub-Committee accepted the representations put forward by the Police that that the PLH/DPS had failed to uphold the licensing objectives particularly that relating to the prevention of crime and disorder.
- 7. The Sub-Committee reminded itself of the statutory guidance relating to a review which urged it to, as far as possible, seek to establish the cause or causes of the concerns identified by the Police's representation and that having done that any remedial action should be directed at those causes and should always be no more than an appropriate and proportionate response to address the causes. However, where criminal activity was alleged, as was the case, wider public policy considerations came into play and the furtherance of the licensing objective engaged included the prevention of crime. In those circumstances, deterrence by way of a revocation, was an appropriate objective and one contemplated by the guidance issued by the Secretary of State.
- 8. The Sub-Committee considered the statutory guidance at Paragraph 11.27 which stated that there was certain criminal activity that might arise in connection with licensed premises which should be treated particularly seriously. The examples cited included the use of the licensed premises for the sale or storage of smuggled tobacco and alcohol.
- 9. The sub-committee had considered the other measures, short of revocation, available to them and concluded that, in the public interest and furtherance of the licensing objectives that it was appropriate and proportionate to revoke the licence.

The PLH/DPS would be advised of the right to appeal within 21 days of being notified of the decision to the Magistrates Court.

7. APPLICATION FOR A REVIEW OF AN EXISTING PREMISES LICENCE

The Chair led on introductions.

The Director of Neighbourhood and Environmental Services submitted a report on an application for the review of an existing premises licence.

The Premises Licence Holder (PLH) / Designated Premises Supervisor (DPS) was present, accompanied by his wife. Mr David Braithwaite, Deputy Licensing Manager for Leicestershire Police was present accompanied by PC Ben Hill, and Ms Minaxi Patel, Trading Standards Officer, Neighbourhood and Environmental Services. Also present was the Licensing Team Manager (Policy and Applications) and the Legal Adviser to the Sub-Committee.

The Licensing Team Manager (Policy and Applications) presented the report. It was noted a review application was received on 15 September 2021 from Leicestershire Police on the grounds of the prevention of crime and disorder and public safety.

Mr Braithwaite was given the opportunity to outline the details of the Police representation.

PC Hill was given the opportunity to present his witness report and answered questions from Members.

Ms Patel was given the opportunity to outline the details of the report from Trading Standards in support of the Police representation.

The PLH/DPS through his wife was given the opportunity to address the Sub-Committee and answered questions from the Police, Members, and the Legal Adviser to the Sub-Committee.

All parties present were then given the opportunity to sum up their positions and make any final comments.

The Sub-Committee received legal advice from the Legal Adviser to the Sub-Committee in the presence of all those present and were advised of the options available to them in making their decision. The Sub-Committee were also advised of the relevant policy and statutory guidance that needed to be taken into account when making their decision.

In reaching their decision, Members felt they should deliberate in private on the basis that this was in the public interest, and as such outweighed the public interest of their deliberation taking place with the parties represented present, in accordance with the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005.

The Chair announced that the decision and reasons would be publicly announced in writing within five working days. The Chair informed the meeting that the Legal Adviser to the Sub-Committee would be called back to give advice on the wording of the decision.

The Chair then informed the meeting that all but the Democratic Support Officers should withdraw from the room. The Sub-Committee then deliberated in private to consider their decision. The Sub-Committee recalled the Legal Adviser to the Sub-Committee to give advice on the wording of the decision.

That the premises licence be REVOKED.

Members of the Sub-Committee were asked to determine an application for the review of an existing premises licence.

In reaching their decision, Members of the Sub-Committee carefully considered

the committee report presented by the Licensing Team Manager (Policy and Applications), all representations made by Leicestershire Police in support of the Application for a Review, the report from the Trading Standards Officer, the representation made by the PLH/DPS and the legal advice given during the hearing.

The Sub-Committee had been asked to determine an application for the review of the premises licence. When considering the application, the licensing objectives were of paramount concern. The Sub-Committee considered the review application on its own merits and in accordance with the licensing authority's Statement of Licensing Policy and statutory guidance issued under S.182 of the Licensing Act 2003.

The current licensable activities which were the subject of the review were set out in paragraph 5.2 of Licensing report presented to the Sub-Committee.

Members were informed Leicestershire Police made an application to review the premises licence on the basis that the PLH/DPS had failed to promote the licensing objectives of the prevention of crime and disorder and public safety due to Illegal cigarettes and tobacco totally 205 boxes being found on 14th September 2021.

Additionally the Police supported their representations by submitting evidence in respect of the PLH/DPS's other premises where:

- Illegal cigarettes and tobacco were found at the premises on 2nd May 2020, 22nd May 2020 and on 17th August 2021
- Boxes of Nitrous Oxide found on the premises on the same dates 2nd May 2020, 22nd May 2020 and 17th August 2021
- A small amount of unlicensed Sildenafil Citrate tablets being found on 17th August 2021.

The Sub-Committee was informed that the Police visit on 17th August 2021 was prompted following intelligence received on 9th July 2021 which stated that the owner of the premises was selling alcohol and cigarettes to children. It was also noted that some of the cigarettes being sold were illegal.

Members noted the application for a review was supported by witness statements made by Police Officer PC Hill and from the Council's Trading Standards officer. Both witnesses attended the hearing and gave direct evidence to the Sub-Committee.

PC Hill had set out the circumstances in which 205 boxes of illegal cigarettes and tobacco were found at the premises. PC Hill informed the Sub-Committee that whilst he was in the premises a customer had arrived and asked for a £5 packet of cigarettes. On being informed of the correct price for a legal box of cigarettes, the customer left the shop without purchasing any cigarettes.

The Council's Trading Standards Officer had informed the Sub-Committee the cigarettes and tobacco did not comply with UK regulations and UK duty had not been paid. The officer also informed Members of the impact on public health

from illegal cigarettes and tobacco and the connection of its supply to organised crime.

The PLH/DPS attended the hearing together with his wife. An interpreter had been arranged for the hearing however the PLH/DPS preferred to make his representation through his wife and the interpreter had been discharged.

The Sub-Committee heard the PLH/DPS opposed the grounds for review. He had not disputed the presence of illegal cigarettes and tobacco at both licensed premises nor did he dispute the presence of the boxes of Nitrous Oxide and the 49 unlicensed tablets of Sildenafil Citrate at the other premises. During the hearing he stated that all of the cigarettes and tobacco found at both premises were for his personal use and that he kept them under the counter at both premises because he had limited storage space. - 6. Having carefully evaluated all of the information and evidence before it, the Sub-Committee accepted the representations put forward by the Police that that the PLH/DPS had failed to uphold the licensing objectives particularly that relating to the prevention of crime and disorder.
- 7. The Sub-Committee reminded itself of the statutory guidance relating to a review which urged it to, as far as possible, seek to establish the cause or causes of the concerns identified by the Police's representation and that having done that any remedial action should be directed at those causes and should always be no more than an appropriate and proportionate response to address the causes. However, where criminal activity was alleged, as was the case, wider public policy considerations came into play and the furtherance of the licensing objective engaged included the prevention of crime. In those circumstances, deterrence by way of a revocation, was an appropriate objective and one contemplated by the guidance issued by the Secretary of State.
- 8. The Sub-Committee considered the statutory guidance at Paragraph 11.27 which stated that there was certain criminal activity that might arise in connection with licensed premises which should be treated particularly seriously. The examples cited included the use of the licensed premises for the sale or storage of smuggled tobacco and alcohol.
- The sub-committee had considered the other measures, short of revocation, available to them and concluded that, in the public interest and furtherance of the licensing objectives that it was appropriate and proportionate to revoke the licence.

The PLH/DPS would be advised of the right to appeal within 21 days of being notified of the decision to the Magistrates Court.

8. ANY OTHER URGENT BUSINESS

There being no other items of urgent business, the meeting closed at 1.07pm.



3. Summary

3.1 This report outlines an application for a new premises licence for Singh Brothers EM Ltd, 258-260 Victoria Road East, LE5 0LF and summarises the representations received. It also highlights the licensing objectives, the relevant parts of the guidance and regulations, and the pertinent sections of the Licensing Authority's Licensing Policy.

5. Application

5.1 An application was received on 13th October 2021 from Mr Baljinder Singh for a new premises licence for Singh Brothers EM Ltd, 258-260 Victoria Road East, LE5 0LF. A copy of the application is attached at Appendix A.

5.2 The application is as follows:

6. Steps to Promote the Licensing Objectives

- 6.1 The steps the applicant proposes to take to promote the licensing objectives are set out in the operating schedule (see section M of Appendix A).
- 6.2 In arriving at its decision on the application, the Licensing Authority's primary consideration must be the promotion of the licensing objectives.

7. Representation

- 7.1 A petition representation was received on 1st November 2021 from local residents and shop owners. The representation relates to the prevention of crime and disorder / the prevention of public nuisance / public safety. The petitioners are emphasising that the crime rate in the area in the last few months consists mostly of violence, criminal damage and anti-social behaviour. There are already two off licence shops in the close proximity, so they believe by having a third alcohol licence on this street it will have a profound increase of the said crimes and will causes severe disturbance and disorder to our neighbours and local customers who reside close by. A copy of the representation is attached at Appendix B1.
- 7.2 A representation was received on 2nd November 2021 from Cllr Cank.. The representation relates to the prevention of crime and disorder / the prevention of public nuisance / public safety. Cllr Cank expresses her opposition to a licence being granted advising that there are already 2 premises in the small parade of shops selling alcohol. She is adding that an application was made for the same premises just over 12 months ago which was strongly opposed by in access of 300 residents in the immediate area.
 - Cllr Cank emphasises that there have been problems with gangs of youths drinking and causing anti-social behaviour which intimidates local people and whilst the police move them on they just come back once the Police have left. There are large number of drinkers that congregate on the Cravens Recreational Ground which is at the rear of the parade of shops. Not only is street drinking a problem but also the amount of cans and bottles littering the area. A copy of the representation is attached at Appendix B2.
- 7.3 A further petition representation was received on 10th November 2021 from residents living around Brackley Close Post Office. The representation relates to the prevention of crime and disorder / the prevention of public nuisance / public safety. The residents strongly oppose the application as there are already a few premises selling alcohol in the area, and given that there are already significant problems with street drinking and anti-social behaviour, another off licence would only escalate what is already a growing problem. A copy of the representation is attached at Appendix B3.

8. Conditions

8.1 The conditions that are consistent with the operating schedule and the representation are attached at Appendix C.





NOTES ON DEMONSTRATING ENTITLEMENT TO WORK IN THE UK

Entitlement to work/immigration status for individual applicants and applications from partnerships which are not limited liability partnerships:

A licence may not be held by an individual or an individual in a partnership who is resident in the UK who:

- does not have the right to live and work in the UK; or
- is subject to a condition preventing him or her from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity.

Any premises licence issued in respect of an application made on or after 6 April 2017 will become invalid if the holder ceases to be entitled to work in the UK.

Applicants must demonstrate that they have an entitlement to work in the UK and are not subject to a condition preventing them from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity. They do this by providing with this application copies or scanned copies of the following documents (which do not need to be certified).

Documents which demonstrate entitlement to work in the UK

- An expired or current passport showing the holder, or a person named in the passport as the child of the holder, is A British citizen or a citizen of the UK and Colonies having the right of abode in the UK [please see note below about which sections of the passport to copy].
- An expired or current passport or national identity card showing the holder, or a person named in the passport as the child of the holder, is a national of a European Economic Area country or Switzerland.
- A Registration Certificate or document certifying permanent residence issued by the Home Office to a national
 of a European Economic Area country or Switzerland.
- A Permanent Residence Card issued by the Home Office to the family member of a national of a European Economic Area country or Switzerland.
- A current Biometric Immigration Document (Biometric Residence Permit) issued by the Home Office to the
 holder indicating that the person named is allowed to stay indefinitely in the UK, or has no time limit on their
 stay in the UK.
- A **current** passport endorsed to show that the holder is exempt from immigration control, is allowed to stay indefinitely in the UK, has the right of abode in the UK, or has no time limit on their stay in the UK.
- A **current** Immigration Status Document issued by the Home Office to the holder with an endorsement indicating that the named person is allowed to stay indefinitely in the UK or has no time limit on their stay in the UK, **when produced in combination with** an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A **full** birth or adoption certificate issued in the UK which includes the name(s) of at least one of the holder's parents or adoptive parents, **when produced in combination with** an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A birth or adoption certificate issued in the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man or Ireland **when produced in combination** with an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A certificate of registration or naturalisation as a British citizen, when produced in combination with an
 official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a
 Government agency or a previous employer.
- A current passport endorsed to show that the holder is allowed to stay in the UK and is currently allowed to
 work and is not subject to a condition preventing the holder from doing work relating to the carrying on of a
 licensable activity.

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In terms of specific regulated entertainments please note that:

- Plays: no licence is required for performances between 08:00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
- Films: no licence is required for 'not-for-profit' film exhibition held in community premises between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day provided that the audience does not exceed 500 and the organiser (a) gets consent to the screening from a person who is responsible for the premises; and (b) ensures that each such screening abides by age classification ratings.
- Indoor sporting events: no licence is required for performances between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 1000.
- Boxing or Wrestling Entertainment: no licence is required for a contest, exhibition or display of Greco-Roman
 wrestling, or freestyle wrestling between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not
 exceed 1000. Combined fighting sports defined as a contest, exhibition or display which combines boxing or
 wrestling with one or more martial arts are licensable as a boxing or wrestling entertainment rather than an
 indoor sporting event.
- Live music: no licence permission is required for:
 - o a performance of unamplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, on any premises.
 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a workplace that is not licensed to sell alcohol on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a church hall, village hall, community hall, or other similar community premises, that is not licensed by a premises licence to sell alcohol, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance from a person who is responsible for the premises.
 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, at the non-residential premises of (i) a local authority, or (ii) a school, or (iii) a hospital, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance on the relevant premises from: (i) the local authority concerned, or (ii) the school or (iii) the health care provider for the hospital.
- Recorded Music: no licence permission is required for:
 - o any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
 - o any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a church hall, village hall, community hall, or other similar community premises, that is not licensed by a premises licence to sell alcohol, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance from a person who is responsible for the premises.
 - o any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, at the non-residential premises of (i) a local authority, or (ii) a school, or (iii) a hospital, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance on the relevant premises from: (i) the local authority concerned, or (ii) the school proprietor or (iii) the health care provider for the hospital.

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- Dance: no licence is required for performances between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the
 audience does not exceed 500. However, a performance which amounts to adult entertainment remains
 licensable.
- Cross activity exemptions: no licence is required between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, with no limit on audience size for:
 - o any entertainment taking place on the premises of the local authority where the entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the local authority;
 - o any entertainment taking place on the hospital premises of the health care provider where the entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the health care provider;

7. Steps to Promote the Licensing Objectives

- 7.1 The steps the applicant proposes to take to demonstrate that the premises will not add to the existing cumulative impact and promote the licensing objectives are set out in the operating schedule (see section M of Appendix B).
- 7.2 In arriving at its decision on the application, the Licensing Authority's primary consideration must be the promotion of the licensing objectives.

8. Regulated Entertainment

- 8.1 The Live Music Act 2012 and the Legislative Reform (Entertainment Licensing) Order 2014 amended the Licensing Act 2003 in relation to the provision of regulated entertainment. Certain entertainment does not require a licence subject to audience limits, between 08.00 and 23.00 hours each day.
- 8.2 The above exemptions may affect the application under consideration because conditions may not be imposed at this stage to control live or recorded music that is unregulated. However, if problems do occur as a result of that entertainment then conditions may be imposed to control such music in the future after a formal review.

9. Representation

- 9.1 A representation was received on 1st November 2021 from the Noise & Pollution Control Team. The representation relates to the prevention of public nuisance. The Noise & Pollution Control Officer is concerned that allowing music outside will cause noise nuisance to local residents. A copy of the representation is attached at Appendix C1.
- 9.2 A representation was received on 21st October 2021 from Leicestershire Police. The representation relates to the prevention of crime and disorder and public safety. Leicestershire Police are concerned that the proposed changed could lead to anti-social behaviour and crime and disorder in the area. Leicestershire Police have proposed two conditions to be added to the licence. These have been agreed with the applicant. A copy of the representation and agreement are attached at Appendix C2.

10. Conditions

10.1 The conditions that are consistent with the operating schedule and the representation are attached at Appendix D.

11 Cumulative Impact

11.1 In February 2005 Leicester City Council introduced a special policy on cumulative impact in the Braunstone Gate area, which refers specifically to on and off licences. The licensing authority must have regard to the special policy. However, this does not change the fundamental way that licensing decisions are made. It is therefore open to the licensing authority to grant an application where it considers it is appropriate and where the applicant can demonstrate in the operating schedule that they would not be adding to the cumulative impact.

- a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
 - at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.

Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises. In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises-

- games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to-i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supplied alcohol), or
 - drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
- provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
- dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).

The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.

The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.

- where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures
 - i) beer or cider: 1/2 pint;
 - gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
- these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
- where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.

All individual(s) at the premises for the purpose of carrying out a security activity must

- (a) be authorised to carry out that activity by a licence granted under the Private Security Industry Act 2001; or
- (b) be entitled to carry out that activity by virtue of section 4 of that Act.





The venue held two events in 2019 that have caused a noise nuisance, and one which resulted in a complaint and was likely to have caused a noise nuisance, although other calls prevented officers from witnessing a nuisance. On each occasion music was played through speakers outside of the premises, in contravention of the premises licence.

On 4th August 2019 at 0130 music from 2funky Bar and Kitchen was sufficiently loud to cause a noise nuisance in an apartment over 300m from the venue. Bass was particularly intrusive, but the volume of music alone, measured in the complainant's bedroom was sufficient to prevent sleep. The source was confirmed as 2funky Bar and Kitchen, where doors and windows were open, and at least one speaker was located outside of the premise. A Temporary Event Notice had been granted for this date, to extend hours beyond existing licenced hours, but had not yet commenced, and at the time that the nuisance was witnessed the premises was operating under then Premises Licence.

On 10th August 2019 at 2130 music from 2funky Bar and Kitchen was again sufficiently loud to cause a noise nuisance in an apartment over 300m from the venue. Bass was intrusive in the complainant's bedroom, dominating the noise from the venue, sufficient to prevent sleep. The source was again confirmed as 2funky Bar and Kitchen, where the source of music was outside of the premise, in contravention of the Premises Licence.

On 31st August 2019 a further complaint was received about loud music from 2funky bar and kitchen. Although other calls prevented officers from visiting the complainant while the noise was allegedly causing a nuisance, brief observations were made outside the premise at 2150, and it was noted that again music was being played outside of the premise, in contravention of the Premises Licence.

I appreciate that no nuisances have been witnessed since 2019, which I presume is because music has been restricted to indoors, in compliance with the exiting licence.

I am satisfied from the above observations that the Premises Licence Holder/Designated Premises Supervisor is unable to manage noise levels from music played outside of the venue. It is clear than any music outside of the premise, other than background music, will cause a noise nuisance to local residents.

The applicant has not proposed any measures in the application to prevent public nuisance from loud music played outdoors.

I therefore recommend that this application, as submitted, be refused.

I write in my capacity as Leicester City Centre's alcohol licensing officer for Leicestershire Police, with delegated authority given by the Chief Constable.

My representation to this full variation licence application is based upon the licensing objectives as per the Licensing Act 2003.

The application in its current format if granted would undermine two of the four licensing objectives in relation to the prevention of crime and disorder and public safety.

This is a variation licence application for an existing licensed premises.

The premises is located at 23 New Park Street, Leicester.

The nearest residential properties are located around the corner on Braunstone Gate.

The premises is located within the "Braunstone Gate Area" cumulative impact zone as referred to in Leicester City Council's Statement of Licensing Policy 2015.

However, this policy is currently being reviewed. The policy states that "these policies cannot be absolute and it will continue to consider each application on its merits. Licences that are unlikely to add to the problems of the cumulative impact area would be approved".

The premises existing opening hours to the public are daily from 11am until 2am.

The premises existing hours for the supply of alcohol is also daily from 11am until 2am, for "on" the premises only.

The premises existing licensable activities including the performance of live music, the playing of recorded music and performance of dance is also "indoors" only.

The applicant has applied to provide live music, recorded music until 2am on Saturday and Sunday morning only both indoors and outdoors as result of the newly refurbished enclosed outdoor area.

The applicant has also applied to supply alcohol daily until 2am both on and off the premises, again within the newly refurbished enclosed outdoor area.

The inclusion of the newly refurbished enclosed outdoor area increases the premises size and capacity.

The proposed changes could potentially increase the likelihood of anti-social behaviour, crime and disorder at or within proximity to the premises regardless of the best intentions of the applicant. Alcohol related violent crime increases given longer hours that customers are permitted to consume alcohol.

Therefore, the management of the external area is paramount.

Leicestershire Police believe that the inclusion of additional conditions would mitigate the risk discussed above and promote the licensing objectives.

The conditions also reflects the applicant's intentions to operate the business in a manner to support the licensing objectives.

Therefore, the two additional conditions proposed are:

- (1) The licence holder will ensure a high definition, coloured CCTV camera system is installed, recording whilst the premises is open to the public and permits the identification of individuals. CCTV images to be securely stored, display an accurate date/time stamp and be retained for a minimum of 31 days. Cameras to cover all of the external areas including the entrance, exit, and outdoor bar area.
- (2) The licence holder will ensure that the use of door supervisors will be risk accessed on an ongoing basis and if deemed necessary all door supervisors will be Security Industry Authority (SIA) registered. A record must be kept which includes their full details (name and SIA badge number), must be clear, eligible, kept on the premises

and available to the responsible authorities upon request.

The applicant has agreed to the eight additional conditions and this is confirmed in a signed written agreement dated Wednesday 20th October 2021.

In light of the above agreement, Leicestershire Police no longer believe that a licensing hearing is required.



It also highlights the licensing objectives, the relevant parts of the guidance and regulations, and the pertinent sections of the Licensing Authority's Licensing Policy.

5. Application

- 5.1 An application was received on 15th October 2021 from Greenhill Licences for a new premises licence for Manishkumar Murubhai Sonraj, C T Supermarket, 85 Hinckley Road, Leicester within the Braunstone Gate area Cumulative Impact Zone. A copy of the application is attached at Appendix A.
- 5.2 The application is as follows:

6. Steps to Promote the Licensing Objectives

- 6.1 The steps the applicant proposes to take to demonstrate that the premises will not add to the existing cumulative impact and promote the licensing objectives are set out in the operating schedule (see section M of Appendix A).
- 6.2 In arriving at its decision on the application, the Licensing Authority's primary consideration must be the promotion of the licensing objectives.

7. Representation

7.1 A representation was received on 20th of October 2021 from a member of the public. The representation relates to the prevention of crime and disorder / the

prevention of public nuisance / public safety/ protection of children from harm. The representation highlights the area is part of the Cumulative Impact Zone and that local residents already have to deal with noise disturbances and antisocial behavior. Representation also highlights there are already four off licence in the close proximity. A copy of the representation is attached at Appendix B1.

- 7.2 A representation was received on 7th of November 2021 from a member of public. The representation relates to the prevention of crime and disorder / the prevention of public nuisance / public safety/ protection of children from harm. The representation highlights the area is part of the Cumulative Impact Zone and it would go again the licensing objectives if granted. The representation also highlights that the premises backs on to the entrance to a nursery and that's this could cause the children to be at risk. The representation states there are currently significantly high issues with crime and disorder, public nuisance and public safety. A copy of the representation is attached at Appendix B2.
- 7.3 A representation was received on 10th of November 2021 from Jeff Pritchard at Leicestershire Police. The representation relates to the prevention of crime and disorder, the prevention of public nuisance, public safety and the protection of children from harm. Leicestershire Police are concerned that the application fails to promote all four licensing objectives. They also highlight that the premises fall within cumulative impact zone and there are currently 16 licensed premises nearby of which 12 sell alcohol. Of these 12, 6 other retail premises supply alcohol for consumption off the premises. A copy of the representation is attached at Appendix B3.
- 7.4 A representation was received on 11th of November 2021 from a member of public. The representation relates to the prevention of crime and disorder / the prevention of public nuisance / public safety/ protection of children from harm. The representation highlights concerns for children attending the nursery at the rear of the store due to an increase in delivery vehicles at the back of store, street drinking and a greater footfall of strangers. A copy of the representation is attached at Appendix B4.

8. Conditions

8.1 The conditions that are consistent with the operating schedule and the representation are attached at Appendix C.

9. Cumulative Impact

9.1 In February 2005, Leicester City Council introduced a special policy on cumulative impact in the Braunstone Gate area, which refers specifically to on and off licences. The licensing authority must have regard to the special policy. However, this does not change the fundamental way that licensing decisions are made. It is therefore open to the licensing authority to grant an application where it considers it is appropriate and where the applicant can demonstrate in the operating schedule that they would not be adding to the cumulative impact.



I write in my capacity as Leicester City Centre's alcohol licensing officer for Leicestershire Police, with delegated authority given by the Chief Constable.

My representation to this new premises licence application is based upon the licensing objectives as per the Licensing Act 2003.

The application in its current format if granted would undermine all four of the licensing objectives.

The premises is located at 85 Hinckley Road, Leicester. LE3 0TD. The premises is located within a built up urban area and upon on a busy road. The area comprises of both retail and commercial properties as well as residential dwellings.

The premises wish to operate as a supermarket selling food products supported by selling alcoholic products.

The premises is located within the "Braunstone Gate Area" cumulative impact zone as referred to in Leicester City Council's Statement of Licensing Policy 2015.

However, this policy is currently being reviewed. The policy states that "these policies cannot be absolute and it will continue to consider each application on its merits. Licences that are unlikely to add to the problems of the cumulative impact area would be approved".

Leicestershire Police's licensing system known as "Inn Keeper" states there are sixteen licensed premises located on Hinckley Road alone, of which twelve supply alcohol. Of these twelve, six other retail premises supply alcohol for consumption off the premises.

The premises proposed opening hours to the public are daily from 8am until 9pm.

The premises proposed hours for the supply of alcohol also mirrors the opening hours of above, therefore daily from 8am until 9pm. The supply of alcohol is for the consumption off the premises only.

Pre-application discussion including a site meeting was held with the applicant as the significance of the cumulative impact area was acknowledged.

Given the premises location within a cumulative impact zone and the issues that originated in its implementation, the application acknowledges this and has made a number of concessions in order to mitigate the risk and not to contribute to the existing concerns.

Several examples of this commitment to support and promote the licensing objectives are included within the application, which includes the supermarkets operating hours, the amount of retail floorspace allocated to the sale of alcohol, CCTV installation / retention policy and certain types of alcohol not exceeding a certain ABV%.

Leicestershire Police believe that the inclusion of additional conditions would mitigate the risk discussed above and promote the licensing objectives.

Therefore, seven additional conditions are proposed:

- (1) The licence holder shall ensure that no more than 10% of the premises floor space is allocated towards the retail sale of alcohol.
- (2) The licence holder shall ensure that alcohol spirits for sale are displayed behind the counter only.
- (3) The licence holder shall ensure that beer, cider or lager above 6.5% ABV is not sold from the premises.
- (4) The licence holder shall ensure a high definition, coloured CCTV camera system is installed, recording whilst the premises is open to the public and permits the identification of individuals. CCTV images to be securely stored, display an accurate date/time stamp and be retained for a minimum of 31 days. Cameras to cover all of the external areas including the entrance, exit, and pavement area immediately

outside the premises.

- (5) The licence holder shall ensure a trained member of staff will be present on the premises when the premises is open to the public who is able to operate the CCTV system and provide viewable images/recordings.
- (6) The licence holder shall ensure CCTV footage is provided to a person from a responsible authority within 24 hours of a Data Protection request.
- (7) The licence holder shall operate a Challenge 25 policy with the only acceptable proof of age identification consisting of a current passport, photo card driving licence or identification carrying a PASS logo.

The applicant has agreed to these seven additional conditions and this is confirmed in a written agreement dated 6th November 2021.

In light of the above agreement, Leicestershire Police no longer believe that a licensing hearing is required.

CONDITIONS CONSISTENT WITH THE OPERATING SCHEDULE

An incident log shall be kept at the premises and made available on request to the police or an authorised officer. The incident log will record all allegations of crime and disorder reported at the site, any complaints received, any faults with the CCTV, any visits by the relevant authority and emergency services.

The incident log shall have a section for the refusal of the sale of alcohol. This shall be kept updated and shall be checked and approved monthly by the designated premises supervisor.

The licence holder shall keep a written record of training and instructions given to each member of staff, training shall cover the licensing objectives, conditions of the premises licence, challenge 25 policy, challenging someone's age, acceptable proofs of ID, how to make a record of refusal, avoiding conflict and the responsible sale of alcohol. If left in charge of the premises staff will be trained in the operation of the CCTV system and how to deal with visits from the relevant authorities. Staff will sign to confirm the have received and understood training. Training shall be given on induction with refresher training given every 12 months. Training records will be produced on request by the relevant authorities.

Challenge 25 shall be operated as the proof of age policy and only a valid passport, photographic driving licence, HM forces photographic ID card or proof of age card with the Pass logo or hologram on it may be accepted.

The premises will not be alchol-led. No more than 10% of the retail area shall be used for the sale or display of alcohol. The premises will have a small designated alcohol area (hatched in red on the licensing plan). The area is isolated and monitored along with the rest of the store and will always be supervised by a member of staff. When not operating the alcohol area can be barriered off completely from the rest of the store.

The business will work positively with the community to deter problematic street drinkers, drunks or underage customers.

The premises will immediately contact the police and where appropriate the ambulance service if crime or serious disorder is or appears to have been committed at the premises.

All appropriate measures are to be taken fully to protect the safety of all persons always present on the premises the premises are open to the public.

As far as it is safe and reasonably practicable, all measures will be taken to apprehend identified suspects and to preserve the crime scene pending the arrival of the police.

The licence holder will at all times maintain adequate levels of staff and security. Such staff and security levels will be disclosed on request to the relevant authorities.

The premises licence holder shall endeavour to eliminate or minimise any nuisance arising out of its licensable activities. In doing so the premises licence holder will work with enforcement authorities where any issues are identified.

A complaints procedure will be maintained for residents to have a means of contact if necessary. A telephone number of the duty manager at the premises shall always be publicly available the premises is open.

Notices will be prominently displayed by entry/exits showing that CCTV is in use, Challenge 25 policy in operation, advice for customers on the provision of the Licensing Act regarding underage and proxy sales, posters advising not to drink in the street and to respect residents and leave quietly, not to loiter outside the premises or in the nearby vicinity and to dispose of litter legally.

Posters will be displayed at the till either electronically or physically reminding staff to ask for identification.

Premises will sell normal standard beers and cider, no more than 6.5% in strength. There will be no sales/supplies of beers, ales, lagers, ciders or anything similar of 7.5% ABV or above save for premium products which can be agreed with the police as a condition.

Any sales for delivery or made by the way of internet orders will not be accepted unless ancillary to a food or grocery order. Or all orders dispatched containing alcohol will be suitable marked and any courier service used will be made aware that identification will need to be shown prior to delivery and will not be left with a third party.

The licensee shall ensure that company staff, and any outside delivery service employed to facilitate the delivery of alcohol, will be trained on the relevant aspects of the Licensing Act, including underage sales, sales to a person who is drunk, obtaining alcohol for a child or a person who is drunk and delivering alcohol to someone under the age of 18.

The premises will have security lights provisioned on all the entrances of the premises.

Motion censored cameras shall be installed, operated and maintained, to function all times that the premises are open for licensable activities.

CCTV recordings will be kept for a minimum of 31days and cameras will be placed throughout the store.

The licensee will ensure that the CCTV system is checked every 2 weeks to ensure that the system is working properly and that the date and time are correct. A record shall be kept of these checks noting the name and date the check is carried out. This will be made available to the police and the relevant authority upon request.

The licensee will make sure the police are updated if the CCTV will not be operating for more than one day of business.

CCTV will be set up so one camera will show a close-up of the entrance to the premises. This camera will capture a clear, full length image of anyone entering the premises. CCTV at the premises will provide full coverage of the interior of the premises and any exterior part of the premises accessible to the public.

CCTV system at the premises will record in real time and recordings will be date and time stamped.

At all times during operating hours there will be at least 1 member of staff on the premises who can operate the system sufficiently to allow the police or an authorised officer to view footage on request.

Downloaded CCTV footage will be provided for free and within 24 hours of a request being made by the police or relevant authority (subject to the Data Protection Act 1998).

CONDITIONS CONSISTENT WITH REPRESENTATION FROM POLICE

The licence holder shall ensure that no more than 10% of the premises floor space is allocated towards the retail sale of alcohol.

The licence holder shall ensure that alcohol spirits for sale are displayed behind the counter only.


The licence holder shall ensure that beer, cider or lager above 6.5% ABV is not sold from the premises.

The licence holder shall ensure a high definition, coloured CCTV camera system is installed, recording whilst the premises is open to the public and permits the identification of individuals. CCTV images to be securely stored, display an accurate date/time stamp and be retained for a minimum of 31 days. Cameras to cover all of the external areas including the entrance, exit, and pavement area immediately outside the premises.

The licence holder shall ensure a trained member of staff will be present on the premises when the premises is open to the public who is able to operate the CCTV system and provide viewable images/recordings.


The licence holder shall ensure CCTV footage is provided to a person from a responsible authority within 24 hours of a Data Protection request.





- The premises will not be alcohol-led. The applicant proposes that no more than 10% of the retail
 area shall be used for the sale or display of alcohol.
- * The likely customer who visits the store will be a person who already lives or works in the area. The store is unlikely to attract new people into the cumulative impact area. It will not operate very late into the night. Alcohol sales will consist of a small curated range of products. Many customers will wish to buy their groceries from the store and buy a bottle of wine or can of beer to take home with them for dinner. It is unlikely to add to the cumulative impact within the area.
- The store is designed for the high street and grocery convenience shopping for local residents and the operating schedule is proposed to protect local residents from crime and nuisance.

The full range of products that will be available to purchase would be those one would expect in a grocery convenience store including meat, poultry, fish, dairy products, vegetables, breakfast goods and prepared meals. Our focus is on high quality popular products. Additionally there will be availability of coffee on the go and freshly baked items for morning goers.
