Highways Maintenance Works

We continue to inspect the footways and carriageways around the ward and in the last 12 months have found actionable defects as follows:

- Carriageway 319 orders
- Footway 623 orders

Road Safety Schemes

Works to install speed cushions along the length of Carisbrooke Road + 1 Pedestrian refuge (close to Carisbrooke Gardens) started on site yesterday (Monday 23rd October) and is programmed to be finished by the 31st October.

School Streets

The road closures on Knighton Drive and Craighill Road and the School Streets on Newhaven Road, Northfold Road and Eastcourt Road have been made legally permanent.

Work to design the permanent closures is underway to make the closures more aesthetically.

Work to promote the Park and Stride and to encourage parents to switch off their engines when parked continues at the Overdale Schools.

Traffic Regulation Orders

Phase 3 of the Clarendon Park residents parking scheme went live in March 2023. We have had some enquiries from Queens Road over the parking issues that this extension has allegedly caused and met with the ward councillors to discuss. At present there are no plans to extend the scheme.

Craighill Road (section between Stanfell Rd and Gainsborough R) is included in the scheme, but after requests from the residents and supported by Councillors, we are changing the majority of this section to free parking. This will be combined with other LEW traffic regulation works and so will take a little time to implement. We anticipate that it will be next year.

Flooding and Drainage

You will all be well aware of the severe flood event on 22nd June 2023. *Background:*

- Intense rainfall event hit the south and east of the city between 5:00pm and 6:30pm
- Moving from southwest to northeast included areas in Oadby and Wigston.
- With a rainfall intensity greater than 32mm per hour
- Over 50mm in total, as much as we can get in one month.
- Sewer systems are generally designed for 12mm to 25mm per hour.
- The hydraulic capacity of the sewers was significantly exceeded leading to overland flow towards the lowest point.
- Flooded roads channelled the flood water.
- Reports were received for over 67 properties that flooded internally.
- The force of the flood water lifted inspection covers and damaged road surfaces.

Lessons learned:

- Property owners were not aware of their flood risk and were under insured.
- Property owners were not aware of what they could do to mitigate the impact of flooding on their property.
- There was a lack of understanding of the council's role and responsibilities and those of other flood risk authorities.

Going forward:

- A detailed report is being prepared into the event and the properties effected. This will be published online.
- These flooding events are becoming more frequent and more severe.
- The drainage infrastructure which can date from the Victorian era is under increasing pressure from urban creep, housing extensions, increased areas of impermeable driveways and gardens paved over and built on.
- New developments sites are using sustainable drainage and green spaces and planting trees to address these pressures.
- The public must become more aware of the risks and respond to the demands of climate change.
