# BELGRAVE CITY WARDEN REPORT

14th March 2024

#### **GENERAL ENFORCEMENT – Littering, paan spitting, bird feeding.**

Regular patrols are conducted in Belgrave throughout the year. Although primary patrols will be focused on Belgrave Road and Melton Road, reported hotspots and problem locations, such as Harrington Street / Martin Street and the shops on Harrison Road, will be included. I will also continue to attend evening patrols with the police every month.

If an offence is witnessed, then a fixed penalty notice (£150) will usually be issued.

#### **BINS ON STREETS**

Domestic bins being left out are not as large a problem as other wards. However, we do have the occasional issue and several streets are under the bin process at the moment. Section 46 notices have been issued to properties failing to bring their bin in.

There are also problems with commercial bins being left out. Several businesses have received Section 47 notices and a couple of Fixed Penalty Notices (£100) have already been issued.

#### **FLY TIPPING**

Belgrave suffers from a regular fly-tipping problem. There are many hotspots through out the ward as well as items frequently left outside houses. Standard warning letters have been issued to all properties on several streets regarding this issue.

So far this year, 8 Fixed Penalty Notices have been issued in relation to Fly-tipping on Cossington Rec (by the recycle bins) and Martin Street green area. These FPNs were a mix of clean-up costs (£90), littering (£150), Duty of Care (£300) and fly-tipping (£400).

Our Cleansing team clear the waste as soon as they can. Investigations can take some time to complete. New posters will be put up in the area this year.

#### **DUTY OF CARE**

It is my intent to visit all businesses in Belgrave this year and ensure that they are using licenced waste carriers to dispose of their waste.

#### Appendix 2

#### **Highway Maintenance**

Checketts Road & the Melton Road Junction carriageway resurfacing will be starting on Saturday 23<sup>rd</sup> March and go through to Tuesday 26<sup>th</sup> March.

Next financial year (2024/25) we will be resurfacing Melton Road (Checketts Road to Loughborough Road)

We will also be undertaking footway works in this stretch, but the exact location/s are yet to be agreed.

We continue to inspect the footways and carriageways in the Belgrave Ward, looking for defects that meet our intervention levels. In the past 12 months we have found and repaired:

- 149 Footway defects
- 160 Carriageway defects

#### **Parking Enforcement**

There have been no significant issues reported to us.

#### **Traffic Regulation Orders**

Doncaster Road potential residents parking scheme - A report is being prepared for the Lead Member to determine a way forward for Doncaster Rd and the surrounding streets.

#### **Melton Road Corridor Improvement Works**

We have a recently started a scheme (as part of the Neighbourhood Street Scene Improvement Programme) to improve the footways and carriageways of Melton Rd, this being such an important corridor for local residents and visitors into the city

Minor works, such as the painting of metal street furniture have already started and we will soon be replacing/removing poles, bollards, bins, etc as part of the decluttering exercise.

Street Light Banners have recently been updated and renewed, specifically the banners on the lamp columns from Belgrave Circle to Loughborough Road

In addition, the renewal of the Heritage Cycle path is also being done in coordination with this improvement programme. This will involve the resurfacing of the entire length (from Troon Way to Rushey Mead Academy) of cycle path. As part of this scheme the junction crossings will also be improved to make it safer for users and signalized crossing upgrades and improvements will be undertaken.
