1. Summary

- 1.1 This report outlines an application under the Gambling Act 2005 for a new premises licence for BoyleSports, 259b Narborough Road, Leicester and summarises the representations received. It also highlights the licensing objectives and the relevant parts of both the statutory guidance and the Licensing Authority's Statement of Licensing Principles.

2. Determination to be made

- 2.1 Having considered the application and representations, Members must consider whether to:
- Grant the application as requested. If the Sub-Committee consider that granting the application would not undermine any of the Licensing Objectives, it should be granted in full as submitted. This would be granted subject to mandatory conditions and conditions consistent with the applicant's operational standards, and any other conditions agreed by the applicant as part of the consultation/mediation process. Any conditions to be attached to a licence must be appropriate to promote the Licensing Objectives.
 - Grant the application as above, but the Sub-Committee could impose extra conditions as it thinks fit, or make amendments to the operating schedule conditions, and/or proposed hours. This option may include adding conditions suggested by other parties at the hearing, including the applicant. Any conditions to be attached to a licence must be appropriate to promote the Licensing Objectives.
 - Refuse the application – if the sub committee concludes that no additional conditions would ensure that the Licensing Objectives would be upheld, then the whole application should be rejected.

3. Application and promotion of the licensing objectives

- 3.1 An application was received on 04 February 2026 from BoyleSports (UK) Limited for a new premises licence for BoyleSports, 259b Narborough Road, Leicester. A copy of the application is attached at Appendix A.
- 3.2 The application is requesting a premises licence to operate as a Betting Shop (other than a track) between 7.00am and 10.00pm (i.e the default times).
- 3.3 In arriving at its decision on the application, the Licensing Authority's primary consideration must be the promotion of the licensing objectives.

3.4 The applicant has submitted a Local Gambling Risk Assessment that outlines in detail how the Licensing Objectives will be upheld. These are attached with the application at Appendix A.

4. Representations

4.1 Two representations were received on 02 March 2026 from members of the public. The representations relate to the prevention of gambling being a source of crime or disorder, being associated with crime or disorder or being used to support crime and the protection of children or other vulnerable persons from being harmed or exploited by gambling.

The representees are concerned that the proposed premises is located in close proximity to a residential area, schools and community centres. Allowing the new premises may increase financial hardship, family breakdowns and addiction in the local community and also criminal activity including theft, fraud and money laundering which in turn may affect local crime rates. They are also concerned that there are already anti-social problems in the area with men congregating and street drinking

which may also increase with this premises. Copies of the representation are attached at Appendix B1-2.

5. Conditions

Regulations impose mandatory and default conditions on gambling licences. These include the hours of operation. An applicant may seek to remove default conditions, but in this case has not done so. The mandatory and default conditions relating to betting premises are set out in Appendix C.

6. Statutory guidance and statement of licensing policy

6.1 The Gambling Act 2005 requires Leicester City Council as a Licensing Authority, to carry out its various licensing functions so as to promote the following three licensing objectives:-

- Preventing gambling from being a source of crime or disorder, being associated with crime or disorder or being used to support crime;
- Ensuring that gambling is conducted in a fair and open way; and
- Protecting children and other vulnerable persons from being harmed or exploited from gambling.

6.2 Any decision made by the Licensing Authority must be in accordance with the licensing objectives. In addition, the Gambling Commission has issued guidance under section 25 of the Gambling Act 2005. The parts of the guidance that are particularly relevant in this case are as follows:

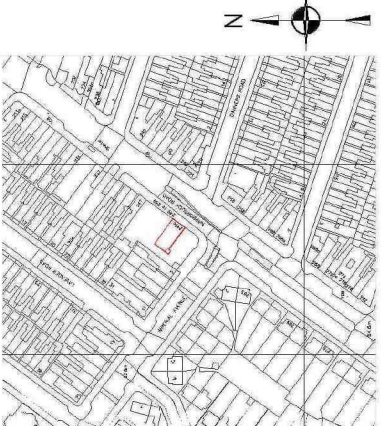

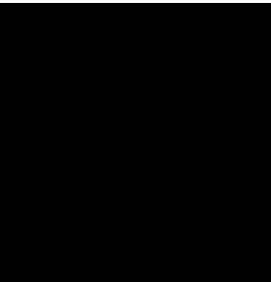

Subject: Objection to Gambling License Application by Boylesports (UK) Limited

Dear Leicester City Council Representative,

I am writing to formally object to the application for a gambling license submitted by Boylesports (UK) Limited, under application reference number (I have been unable to find this on the Leicester gov website), currently under review by your office.

As a concerned resident of the Westcotes area, I believe that granting this license would not be in the best interest of the community for several reasons, which I would like to outline below:

1. **Negative Social Impact:** Gambling establishments often contribute to an increase in problem gambling, which can lead to a range of social issues, including financial hardship, family breakdowns, and addiction. The proposed location of the gambling establishment, located in close proximity to residential areas, schools, and community centers, would likely exacerbate these problems and affect vulnerable populations in our community.
2. **Increased Crime and Disorder:** Previous studies and reports indicate that gambling venues can attract criminal activity such as theft, fraud, and money laundering, as well as incidents of disorderly behavior. Given the history of such issues associated with similar venues in the area, there is a strong concern that this license would contribute to a rise in local crime rates.
3. **Impact on Local Businesses:** I am concerned about the adverse effects that a gambling establishment could have on nearby businesses. The influx of patrons may discourage family-friendly establishments and drive away customers from local shops, restaurants, and other businesses that contribute to the local economy.
4. **Environmental and Traffic Issues:** The location of the proposed gambling venue is already a congested area with limited parking. The influx of visitors to the site could lead to increased traffic congestion, parking issues, and environmental degradation, which would negatively affect the quality of life for local residents and visitors alike.
5. **Public Health Concerns:** With the growing awareness of the mental health issues associated with gambling, such as addiction and anxiety disorders, I strongly believe that approving this license could contribute to an increase in local public health problems, which would place additional strain on healthcare services in the area.


In light of these concerns, I respectfully urge your office to carefully reconsider the application for a gambling license submitted by Boylesports (UK) Limited. I am confident that, as a community, we can work together to find alternative solutions that promote the welfare and safety of all residents.

SUMMARY OF MANDATORY AND DEFAULT CONDITIONS BETTING PREMISES (OTHER THAN TRACK)

Mandatory conditions attaching to every premises licence

- (1) The conditions specified in paragraphs (2), (3) and (4) shall be attached to every premises licence.
- (2) The summary of the terms and conditions of the premises licence issued under section 164(1)(c) of the 2005 Act shall be displayed in a prominent place within the premises.
- (3) The layout of the premises shall be maintained in accordance with the plan.
- (4) The premises shall not be used for—
 - (a) the sale of tickets in a private lottery or customer lottery, or
 - (b) the sale of tickets in any other lottery in respect of which the sale of tickets on the premises is otherwise prohibited^(a).
- (5) In this regulation—
 - (a) a “private lottery” means a private society lottery or a work lottery within the meaning of paragraphs 10 and 11 of Schedule 11 to the 2005 Act; and
 - (b) a “customer lottery” has the same meaning as in Part 3 of Schedule 11 to the 2005 Act.

Mandatory conditions attaching to betting premises licences (other than track premises licences)

1. A notice stating that no person under the age of 18 years is permitted to enter the premises shall be displayed in a prominent place at every entrance to the premises.
- 2.—(1) Access to the premises shall be from a street or from other premises with a betting premises licence.
 - (2) Without prejudice to sub-paragraph (1), there shall be no means of direct access between the premises and other premises used for the retail sale of merchandise or services.
3. Subject to anything permitted by virtue of the 2005 Act, or done in accordance with paragraphs 4, 5, 6 and 7 below, the premises shall not be used for any purpose other than for providing facilities for betting.
4. Any ATM made available for use on the premises shall be located in a place that requires any customer who wishes to use it to leave any gaming machine or betting machine in order to do so.
5. No apparatus for making information or other material available in the form of sounds or visual images may be used on the premises, except for apparatus used for the following purposes—
 - (a) communicating information about, or coverage of, sporting events, including—
 - (i) information relating to betting on such an event; and
 - (ii) any other matter or information, including an advertisement, which is incidental to such an event;
 - (b) communicating information relating to betting on any event (including the result of the event) in connection with which betting transactions may be or have been effected on the premises.

6. No publications, other than racing periodicals or specialist betting publications, may be sold or offered for sale on the premises.

7. No music, dancing or other entertainment shall be provided or permitted on the premises, save for entertainment provided in accordance with paragraph 5.

8.—(1) No alcohol shall be permitted to be consumed on the premises at any time during which facilities for gambling are being provided on the premises.

(2) A notice stating the condition in sub-paragraph (1) shall be displayed in a prominent place at every entrance to the premises.

9. A notice setting out the terms on which customers are invited to bet on the premises shall be displayed in a prominent place on the premises to which customers have unrestricted access.

Default conditions attaching to betting premises licences (other than in respect of tracks)

No facilities for gambling shall be provided on the premises between the hours of 10pm on one day and 7am on the next day.

By virtue of paragraph(s) 1, 2, 3 of Part 1 of Schedule 12A
of the Local Government Act 1972.
