A successful cultural and community dinner and dance event was held at the Peepul Centre for people living in Evington and Stoneygate Wards. Monies received from Community Ward funding had helped towards the cost of hiring a DJ and hall hire. The event organisers had been unable to find a venue available in either of the wards. The religious ceremony was honoured by a religious VIP guest from India. Mr Alan Fox gave feedback on funding received by Highfields Association of Residents and Tenants (HART) over the past year: £800 funding was received and put towards the 2014 South Highfields street party, which was a huge success. Photographs of the day can be found on the HART website. £240 funding was granted towards a South Highfields coach trip to Skegness. Everyone who went on the trip enjoyed themselves, though it was reported to be warmer in Leicester than it was in Skegness on the day.
