

Adopt a KPI – suggested adopters

- The 4 main KPIs to remain in house under the oversight of myself and Brian and the leadership team – we will bring in support as and when required.
- **Accommodation** – *is it worth considering housing rep at the board? – open for discussion* or we will keep it within the leadership team as we do currently report on it
- **ETE** - The percentage of children in the community and being released from custody attending a suitable ETE arrangement. *Sue/sophie*
- **SEND needs** - The percentage of children who have an identified SEND need (or ALN in Wales), are in suitable ETE and have a formal learning plan in place for the current academic year. *Jessica Nicholls*
- **Mental health care and emotional wellbeing** The percentage of children in the community and being released from custody with a screened, or, identified need for an intervention to improve mental health or emotional wellbeing; and of that the percentage of planned/offered interventions; of that percentage of children attending interventions. – *Kayleigh Lord CAMHS*

- **Substance misuse** - The percentage of children with a screened or identified need for specialist treatment intervention to address substance misuse; and of that the percentage of children with planned or offered intervention/treatment; and of that the percentage number of children attending intervention/treatment _

- **Management Board Attendance** - Monitoring senior partner representation at management boards, and monitoring if partners contribute data from their individual services that identify areas of racial and ethnic disproportionality. – **Martin Samuels**
- **Wider services** - The percentage of children who are currently on either an Early Help (EH) plan; on a child protection (CP) plan or classified as Child in need (CiN) or have looked-after status. For Wales only, children who are classified as Children in Need of Care and Support – **Brian Bodsworth (with support from Damian Elcock)**
- **Serious Youth Violence** - The rates of children convicted for a serious violent offence on the YJS caseload.-

- **Victims** - The percentage of victims who consent to be contacted by the YJS, and of those, the percentage of victims who are engaged with about restorative justice opportunities, asked their view prior to out-of-court disposal decision-making and planning for statutory court orders, provided information about the progress of the child's case (when requested) and provided with information on appropriate services that support victims (when requested). –**Bob Bearne?**

Children Looked After

- CLA numbers 17 compared to 11 (March 22)
- 4 out of 17 (24%) young people have re-offended which is a decrease from previous reporting periods which was (45%)
- Children already looked after before they entered the criminal justice system is 47% (8 out of 17) when compared to previous quarter 36% (4 out of 11)
- More CLA young people have committed lesser gravity score offences and have received more First tier orders.

Education Training and Employment

- Moving towards 75% full time EET (pre covid)
- 26 young people completed their CYPJS order in this quarter.
- 75% School age children/56% above school age children are in employment, education or training.
- 5 young people were NEET at the end of their CYPJS order in this quarter (1 statutory/4 above school age).

Auditing work/QA

* 7 full case file audits as part of the QA Framework with Children Looked After and Co-Produced Plans being key themes during Quarter 4 (6 graded as good with one RI)

- 51 AssetPlus initial assessment/reviews/closures were countersigned by managers
- 3 Observations took place – all good

- **Good practice**

- - Diversity needs
- -Good assessments of needs and plans to address areas
- -Strong and positive professional relationships
- -Confidence of courts
- Specialist staff within CYPJS and strong multiagency

- **Areas for development/concern**

- - feedback form YP – only 53% feedback forms received – significant issue to address
- -Specialist staff being removed from CYPJS and sometimes individual roles not clear in plan i.e. social worker
- -reoffending rates increasing and need to ensure work on this with YP – role of ISFC coordinator needs to be strengthened.

- -Team managers to continue to work on QA action plan to close the gap.
