There are no current plans to close LPUs. The Force will undergo transactional changes within the next 12 months but implement transformational changes in the delivery of services post 2014. We look to change our service to meet the demands of 21<sup>st</sup> Century policing with flexible deployment across unhelpful internal boundaries. Local Policing will remain critical to our service delivery and more Neighbourhood officers will work out of partner's buildings, increasing their visibility.

Consultation will be central to and decision making around these changes and partners are likely to be consulted at the end of September after a menu of options have been approved by the Change Board.

### **Neighbourhood Policing and Partnership Approach**

Neighbourhood policing benefits from local partners working together to identify and jointly problem solve issues that are identified from both police and partner data – this approach and way of working is undertaken through Joint Action Groups (JAGs).

Partners meet on a monthly basis to discuss issues of anti-social behaviour and crime and have been effective in addressing local issues.
